Notice MEMBERSHIP MEETING January 12th, 7:30pm Clubhouse

At all meetings of the Association, the presence of 25 members shall be necessary to constitute a quorum. If there are insufficient members present to establish a quorum at the time a membership meeting is to be held, a substitute meeting may be called under the following procedure:

- A. A majority of the members present calls for the substitute meeting. Then,
- B. The presiding officer shall set a date falling within 30 days for a substitute meeting of members; and
- C. Notice of this substitute meeting shall be given 10 days or more in advance to all members of the Association, and shall include the following information;
 - 1. the time, place and purpose of the meeting; and
 - 2. a statement explaining that at the substitute meeting the members present constitute a quorum.
- D. All absentee published ballots not counted for lack of a quorum at a membership meeting shall be counted

President's Perspective

This will be the last time I have the privilege of writing this column and sharing information with the entire community. My term on the Board of Governors (BOG) expires in January and I will not seek reelection. Over the last year we have accomplished several major tasks.

Under the leadership of our Treasurer, John Berley, we have transitioned our finances to a new bank, BB&T. John led a competitive process to ensure that the CSCIA selected a banking partner that met the needs of the BOG and the community at large. John and Beaches and Parks chair, Frank Newman, served on a committee, which developed specifications and solicited bids for the replacement of the bulkhead around the parking at Deep Creek. That project should be well underway by the time you receive this issue of The Caper.

The BOG continued to oppose over development on the Broadneck Peninsula, along with our friends, the Broadneck Council of Communities, the Growth Action Network, the Arnold Preservation Society, the Greater Severna Park Council, and the Magothy River Association. They all supported our opposition to the special exception sought by Koch Homes, Inc. for a project that borders the homes of approximately 40 Cape residents. Most of these organizations testified at the hearing held on November 5, 2009. The decision whether or not to grant the special exception will be issued in early December.

Thank you all for the opportunity to serve the community of Cape St. Claire.

MINUTES CSCIA BOARD OF GOVERNORS

EXECUTIVE COMMIT-TEE MEETING OCTOBER 19, 2009

A meeting of the CSCIA, Board of Governors, Executive Committee and Budget Committee was convened on October 19, 2009 at 7:45 P.M. in the Cape St. Claire Clubhouse, Cox Meeting Room.

Attendance:

Executive Committee members President Biondi, Treasurer Berley and Secretary Newman were in attendance. Budget Committee member Buchet was also present. Governors Gallagher and Mooneyhan were also in attendance.

Purpose of the meeting is to review drafts of the fiscal year 2011 proposed budgets, identify areas needing adjustments, and agree upon a final draft of the FY 2011 Budget to be published to the membership for review.

Treasurer Berley provided three iterations of a "draft" fiscal year 2011 Budget.

Iteration 1: FY 2011 Budget

Treasurer Berley:

This iteration is based on a \$89 tax cap per lot. He is expecting lower income on HOA packages. We did over \$4,000 in HOA package fees for 2009. 2010 will probably be worse.

Interest income is up across the board. Rental income for boat slips is up a little.

Postal fees were increased. Basically a 3% increase across the board. Unfortunately this iteration left negative balances in SCBD Regular, Clubhouse and Caper.

Sanitary services were paid only by SCBD funds. There are six total porta-potties: two at Lake Claire, two at Main Beach, one at Deep Creek and one at Little Magothy area. He asked if these expenses could be shared? Governor Newman talked about moving \$400 from line item 21, Maintenance, into line item number 22, Sanitary Services.

...President Biondi commented that we like to keep "Maintenance" funds (non-SCBD) full in order to have some flexibility to fill other requirements, so we should try not to touch these funds.

Piers Committee, Governor Gallagher, agreed to pay for one porta-potty (Sanitary Services) and for one dumpster (Trash Collection, line item 26) at Lake Claire or Deep Creek.

Iteration 2: FY 2011 Budget

Treasurer Berley stated that this iteration is also based on a \$89 tax cap per lot. Difference between iterations 1 and 2, is the size of the deficits under SCBD. Governor Gallagher noted a problem with line item 27, Utilities. He noted that utilities are about \$17K, not \$1K. After discussions based on past history and charges already incurred this fiscal year, it was agreed to set the amount at \$17,000. Governor Berley will change the amount In this iteration, wages for beach attendants was moved

Iteration 3: FY 2011 Budget

over to "Maintenance."

Treasurer Berley stated that this iteration is based on a \$95 tax cap per lot.

We zero out at the \$95 rate, as opposed to negative balances in the first two iterations.

Caper income was reduced. President Biondi asked about past Caper income with 10 issues. Treasurer Berley stated that we budgeted \$28K but realized about \$26K. Based on this, President Biondi's strong recommendation is to budget \$3,500 - \$5,000 revenue for the four published Caper issues. Plans are to also have eight on-line issues of the Caper.

Governor Gallagher questioned item 9 under Income. Treasurer Berley stated this was the money being held in the Money Markets, and asked, if not shown here, where would Governor Gallagher like it shown. Governor Gallagher stated he "did not want these funds to show at all." President Biondi stated we must show carryover funds. ...Governor Gallagher stated these are not carryover funds but are Savings Account funds.

President Biondi – Fiscal year 2009 carryover balances go to the fiscal year 2011 Budget because the fiscal year 2010 Budget is already passed. To explain the \$34K and \$21K in item 9 under Income, as carryover skips a fiscal year, these funds are shown as a "Savings" vice a carryover. Governor Newman – we need to know the actual carryover from fiscal year 2009, which is not \$34,000.

Governor Gallagher summarized his changes:

Item 9 under Income: Drop the \$21K.

Trash – add \$2,250.

Utilities – increase to \$17K.

Drop the \$15,000 down to \$7,500 for Improvements

Additional Budget Actions:

President Biondi stated that the Board was required to review both the \$89 and the \$95 tax cap levels. The Board, in conjunction with the Treasurer and Budget Committee, did this and decided the \$95 level is required.

Treasurer Berley will review the revised draft budget and make the noted fixes, then forward it to back to everybody, including Governor Maltz for publication in the Caper.

President Biondi asked that this "draft" budget be published in the next Caper. The article should state that this is a "draft" budget and that the "final" budget will appear in the December/January Caper with the ballots.

President Biondi asked to take a vote on part of the Executive Committee - that Treasurer Berley revise the budget based on the input provided; distribute copies of the revised "draft" budget back to all; and by a simple e-mail confirm that this budget will be published as a "draft" in the Caper. The vote passed unanimously.

Adjournment: Governor Newman made a motion to adjourn the October 19, 2009 CSCIA Executive Committee and Budget Committee meeting. Governor Berley seconded the motion and it was unanimously approved. This meeting was adjourned at 8:45 PM.

BOARD IN BRIEF

The November 2009 CSCIA Monthly Board of Governors meeting was convened on November 9, 2009 at 7:30 P.M. in the Cape St. Claire Clubhouse, Cox Meeting Room.

President's Remarks: President Biondi

Expressed that later in the meeting he would like for a Board member to make a motion to allow the Growth Action Network to use our names. This group willing spends money in an effort to control growth in the area. Expressed that in 2010 the CSCIA would be appointing a liaison to represent them on the Broadneck Council of Communities. He would consider serv-

ing as that liaison.

Members of the Broadneck Council of Communities and others cross-examined representatives of Koch Homes at the KHI hearing. Koch Homes is requesting a Special Exception using a blend of LDA and RCA land designations to maximize their building density. This is what the community groups are fighting. We should get a decision in about four weeks.

Minutes: Minutes of the July 13, 2009 CSCIA Monthly BOG meeting: Governor Daly made a motion to enter into a Closed Session Meeting. The motion was seconded and unanimously approved.

Closed Session Meeting: 7:50 PM – 8:00 PM A motion was passed in Closed Session to

amend the draft minutes of the July 13, 2009 CSCIA Monthly BOG meeting.

Minutes – Continued: Minutes of the September 14, 2009 CSCIA Monthly BOG meeting: Governor Maltz made a motion to approve these minutes. Governor Gallagher seconded the motion and it was unanimously approved.

Profit & Loss Statements (P&Ls):


Governor Berley briefed the Board on the August 31, 2009 Profit & Loss Statements. Governor Gallagher made a motion to approve these P&L Statements. Governor Newman seconded the motion and it was unanimously approved.

Governor Berley briefed the Board on the September 30, 2009 Profit & Loss Statements. Governor Gallagher made a motion to approve these P&L Statements. Governor Newman seconded the motion and it was unanimously approved. There were no questions about the October 31, 2009 Preliminary P&Ls

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Beaches & Parks – Governor Newman reported:

- Making progress on the bulkhead repair project. President Biondi and Governor Berley are working on funding and loan actions.
- President Biondi, Governor Berley and he reviewed the quotes received in response to their RFP. They agreed the best quote was from Walsh and Sons, as they provided a good quote and have a "track record" of doing good work.
- The decision is down to materials; probably deciding on the standard materials recommended in all of the quotes.
- The bulkhead project was divided into four sections -A, B, C and D. The Board agreed to contract for the repairs to sections A, B and C. The project would take about 30 days and will be completed this winter most likely beginning sometime in December. The boat ramp and piers area will be made available as much as possible throughout the work. The quotes did not include asphalt work around the boat

Governor Maltz made a, "Motion to accept the Walsh

ramp area, which will cost ap-

proximately another \$12K -

\$20K.

& Sons quote and recommendations to repair the bulkheads." Governor Daly seconded the motion and it was unanimously passed.

...President Biondi asked that Governor Newman place an article in the Caper about the work. ...Governor Gallagher stated he would coordinate the installation of the bubbler system with this work, and that he would ensure the slips along bulkhead sections A, B and C would be vacant.

Piers: Governor Gallagher provided updated status on a legal action in progress for nonpayment of slip fees. The legal documents have been filed. He will advise the BOG as the case progresses. He also sent an email to boat slip renters advising them of slip news, including a 20% rental rate increase next year.

Caper: Governor Maltz looking at meeting the \$18,500 income for this fiscal year. She also commented that if the plan is to only print four issues of the Caper next year and not include advertisements – that she will need to send letters to the current advertisers to advise them of such.

Covenants: Governor Daly reported that he received a fax complaint about conditions at a Cape property. He advised the BOG that this complaint would be processed through normal channels. He also asked the BOG to consider ways to identify and curtail the selling of firewood.

Roads: Governor Campbell stated the County is still at least six months away from starting the Cape St. Claire Road improvement project. ... Vice President Gardner stated she spoke to Dan Anderson last week and he told her that the





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project was delayed because they were working from an incorrect survey.

OLD BUSINESS:

- Review of the Draft Budget: The Board discussed the draft budget and had no major issues. Governor Daly requested that the Code Enforcement line item be increased from \$2,500 up to \$3,000. The Treasurer, Governor Berley, stated that he would attempt to "find" funds for this request and other minor adjustments, and advise the committee chairs via e-mail. Governor Daly made a, "Motion that the BOG approve the Draft Budget and publish it in the Caper pending final administrative changes (not to exceed 5%) by the Treasurer." Governor Maltz seconded the motion and it was unanimously passed.
- Governor Newman expressed a concern about covering beach attendant salaries for the remainder of this fiscal year. The current fiscal year budget has \$7,500 allocated for this purpose, but 75% of those funds have already been spent. To cover these salaries until July 1, 2010, he recommended that

\$3,500 be moved from the Security Patrol line item to the Beach Attendant line item. The Board discussed this issue at length. ...Governor Newman then made a, "Motion to move \$3,500 in wages from the Security Patrol to the Beach Attendant line items." Governor Gallagher seconded the motion and it passed with five in favor and two Board members opposed.

NEW BUSINESS:

- Governor Newman expressed that the beach attendants will use a roster to better control beach / park admittance in 2010 and that residents that could not provide a valid CSC address and resident last name may be asked to provide some other proof of residency.
- On the issue of locking the Main Beach gates at night, Governor Newman advised the BOG that he was just notified that the Security Patrol could not always be available to lock the gate at 10 PM every night, therefore, alternative solutions are required. He expressed the desire to take hours away from the normal Security Patrol to pay another Security Patrol to

- lock the gates at 10 PM. ...A motion to table this issue was denied. ...President Biondi expressed that this level of action by a committee chair does not need a motion. The BOG agreed that since we are paying them for their services, that we should possess a schedule of their security patrols and a contract detailing services to be rendered.
- Governor Gallagher requested a clarification on the closing time of our CSCIA beaches and parks properties. Specifically, is it only the Main Beach area that closes at 10 PM or all Cape beaches and parks? ... President Biondi responded that the approved motion in the July minutes stated that all Cape beaches and parks close at 10 PM. ... Governor Gallagher asked that this be clarified in the next issue of the Caper.
- Governor Gallagher asked about identifying exceptions to the trespassing restrictions, including boat slips users and their guests. President Biondi pointed out the same circumstances apply to the parking lot areas. This subject will be an agenda item for next month's BOG meeting.



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Attendance:

Governors Berley, Biondi, Campbell, Daly, Gallagher, Gardner, Maltz and Newman were present. Governors Lamb and Mooneyhan were absent. Budget Committee members Ritenour and Buchet were also present.

Adjournment: Governor Campbell made a motion to adjourn the November 2009 CSCIA BOG Monthly meeting. Governor Maltz seconded the motion and it was unanimously approved. The November 9, 2009 CSCIA Monthly BOG meeting was adjourned at 10:00 PM.



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Budget Article:

The entire community votes annually on the budget for the Cape St. Claire Improvement Association (CSCIA), which is responsible for the funds received from our three major revenue sources: the Special Community Benefit District (SCBD), the Piers, and the ten dollar general maintenance fee. The budget is developed by the Budget Committee, which is composed of the CSCIA President and Treasurer and up to three committee members elected by the community. The Fiscal Year 2011 proposed budget which is being put before the community for a vote is included in this issue of The Caper.

In accordance with our charter as a Special Community Benefit District (SCBD), funds separated into four major catagories: Maintenance of community property (beaches and parks, playground equipment, and the fishing pier); special security for community property; the acquisition, improvement and construction of real and personal property (such as the Clubhouse); and administrative expenses incidental to carrying out these functions. A year and a half ago the Board of Governors (BOG) was authorized by the membership to borrow up to \$100,000 to undertake a bulkhead replacement

project around the parking area and boat ramp at Deep Creek. Late that summer, the BOG hired a marine engineer and a consultant to inspect the condition of the bulkhead. The report received by the BOG indicated that replacement of the bulkhead should commence post haste. The CSCIA immediately drafted a request for funding which was sent to the four banks on the peninsula. As part of acquiring funding we were also requesting bids for the banking total relationship. This process was completed in early May when BB&T was selected. Once the bank was chosen, the CSCIA, as a county chartered SCBD, had to have a bill passed by the Council since the County underwrites the loan. With the County as the guarantor this allowed us to obtain very favorable terms. The bill was finally passed on September 27th, at which point we issued requests for proposals to several marine contractors. We are making final arrangements with a marine contractor and have settled the loan.

The FY 2011 budget includes funds to make the second payment on the six year note [first payment is in the current, 2010, budget]. This capital project created a need to raise the SCBD assessment from \$75 to \$89 per tax lot per year, which the membership approved along with an increase in the SCBD cap to \$95.00 per year. Since the SCBD cap can only be raised every other year, the increase to \$95.00 allows the Budget Committee and BOG to meet the ever increasing

costs of energy, security, and maintenance and consider other capital projects that may be recommended by the membership over the next two fiscal years.

The 2011 budget reflects a request for a \$6.00 increase per tax lot to cover the increase in operating expenses that we have been experiencing over the last several years. This increase means the difference between breaking even or having to make significant cuts in a budget that is already razor thin. Given this, BOG respectfully recommends the approval of the budget with the increase in the assessment. We should note that there has been no increase in the assessment to cover operating costs in the last seven years.

There's a small cemetery on Swan Drive known as the Stinchcomb-Tydings cemetery. It is located on land once owned by William Stinchcomb and several generations of his forefathers.

One of the headstones still visible is that of Henry Tydings, 1826-1911. Henry Tydings bought the Goshen Farm in 1853 and lived there until his death at the ripe old age of 85. He was the grandson of Keeley Tydings, who served in the Maryland Militia during the revolution, attaining the rank of Sergeant.

Among the five children he raised at the house was Judge Henry A. Tydings, Chief Judge of the Orphans Court. Another son, Oliver, became a medical doctor in Chicago. At the time

of his death he had thirteen grandchildren and eight great grand children.

The headline of his obituary read "An aged and saintly man who did much good laid to rest". In the same document it states "He sheltered the orphans, having raised sixteen children outside his own." It must have been quite a scene up at the old house.

Inscribed on his stone is "C.S.A." The area was largely pro confederate during the civil war, and many of the local males "went south" to serve the rebel army. A Sandy Point lighthouse keeper wrote in 1864 "I am the only union man within ten miles of my residence. You may guess the feelings of my neighbors towards me."

Henry, however, was present in Maryland during the war. On May 28th, 1864, he sent a letter to Lt. JS Wharton, at the request

of the Union Army commander in Annapolis. A group of Union soldiers had been roaming the area attempting to forcibly impress slave and free blacks into the army, causing many of the local blacks to go into hiding. The group was physically threatening to the citizens, and Henry had witnessed it.

What role Henry played in the civil war is not known. Many confederate records have been destroyed. Tydings family history states that he was "not in uniform" and a blockade runner. If true, he would have been more the rule than the exception for this area during those turbulent times.

This is a free program. We thank the many residents of the Broadneck peninsula that participated this past season.


