BOARD IN BRIEF

CSCIA BOARD OF GOVERNORS MONTHLY MEETING FEBRUARY 14, 2011

The February 2011 CSCIA Monthly Board of Governors meeting was convened on February 14, 2011 at 7:30 P.M. in the Cape St. Claire Clubhouse, Cox Meeting Room.

President's Remarks: President Gallagher presented the agenda for the meeting and made brief opening remarks, including:

- A resident, cited by the police for trespassing on the Cape piers after hours, recently appeared in court and was sentenced by the judge.
- A "top to bottom" review of our current CSCIA insurance policy is needed. A special committee, headed by Vice President Mooneyhan, was formed to initiate this review.
- One of our CSCIA Board members submitted their resignation due to a personal situation.

Minutes and Profit & Loss Statements (P&Ls):

A motion was made and approved to accept the Minutes of the December 13, 2010 CSCIA

Monthly BOG meeting as amended. Motions were also made and approved to accept the November 30, 2010 and December 31, 2010 Profit & Loss Statements.

Vice President Mooneyhan:

Recently attended the Broadneck Council of Communities (BCC) meeting, along with Governor Gardner and Lou Biondi, from our community. The BCC is a group of community leaders which focuses on environmental and development issues, among others, affecting the Broadneck Peninsula and our neighboring waterways.

This particular meeting was hosted by Cape St. Claire, and our District 5 Councilman, Dick Ladd, was the special guest. The BCC community members took this opportunity to share their concerns and ideas with our newly elected Councilman.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Beaches and Parks: Governor Newman reported that he is renewing efforts to identify and evaluate proposals to control the complex issue of beach erosion taking place at the Lake Claire beach area.

Clubhouse: Governor Lamb

expressed the need to replace all of the worn tables and chairs used at the clubhouse. She also mentioned that this year's Cape Cleanup is scheduled for the weekend of May 14th.

Caper: Governor Lamb is actively seeking to identify cheaper printing companies in an effort to increase the number of Caper issues published annually, and thereby also increase the number of advertisers using the Caper.

Piers: President Gallagher reported that boat slip rental contracts were mailed out at the end of December.

NEW BUSINESS:

A motion was made and unanimously approved to have representatives of our CSCIA-paid security patrols provide a briefing



There have been reports of 3 river otters this winter, several fox, and even a badger. We would like to add your picture of a living creature in or around the Little Magothy River. The otters love the snow. Look for seal shaped depressions in new snow. They are catching and eating carp. Otters can be seen catching the last rays at sunset sometimes.

They are very timid, and quickly dive underwater if they see movement.

There is also a pair of eagles with their immature youngster, it is still all brown and 1-2 years old. If the youngster is almost 2 years old his head and wings will be turning white soon. The 3 eagles can be seen circling over the river catching the up currents. Sometimes they are very high in the sky. They are also catching fish.
