#### Vice President's Remarks:

Vice President Gallagher briefly mentioned the recent arson fire of our kayak racks and

#### **Minutes and Financials:**

A motion was made to approve the September 8, 2008 Monthly BOG meeting minutes as amended. Another motion was made to table the August 31. 2008 Financials until the November 10, 2008 Monthly BOG meeting. Both motions were seconded and approved.

#### **Idle Chatter**

Idling can be defined as: a parked car with the engine running. This occurs all too often near our local schools during pick-up times. 


## Did You Know....

# 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Baltimore Harbor Light

Have you ever wondered about the octagonal red and white lighthouse seen in the bay from the Cape St. Claire Main Beach? It is the Baltimore Harbor Light, which has marked the entry of the Baltimore Channel since October 1, 1908.

A kitchen and parlor are on the first floor of the brick section, with two bedrooms upstairs. Plumbing consisted of a kitchen hand pump drawing water from a cistern housed in the top of the caisson and a cast iron outhouse perched outside the lighthouse railing (imagine that in







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the winter). A watch room was tucked under the roof. Boat davits lifted the keepers' boats out of the water and access ladders led to the living quarters (they have been pulled up to protect the property from further vandalism).

Building the light presented a profound engineering challenge because of wintry fields of moving ice on the bay and a 55 foot layer of thin mud resting on top of firm sand under the shoal. The only design that could hold up was a caisson foundation capable of resisting 100 mph winds, 30,000 pounds of ice pressure per square foot, and a 3 mph current.

Congress approved increased construction funding of \$180,000 in 1902. Two years

later, the contractor floated the 30-foot diameter iron-plated caisson to the site and sank the bottom 8 feet of it into the mud. After two days, heavy seas filled the caisson, which listed by 7 feet and fell over completely in a bad storm the next month. The contractor gave up and walked off the job (or swam?). It took 3 years to get construction restarted and to get the caisson upright again. It rests on 91 pilings driven into the bottom of the shoal, and stands 82 feet below sea level. the tallest caisson in the world at the time.

The original light was magnified through a fourth-order (i.e., medium size) Fresnel lens.

A light keeper manned the light until 1923, when it became

electrified. A foghorn also replaced the old bell that year. Interestingly, in 1964, it became the world's first atomic-powered light-house, when an experimental 60-watt genera-

tor was installed. It was removed after 2 years, however, because of environmental and cost concerns. The light is still active (with solar power now operating the flashing white light). Sold at auction by the State of Maryland to private citizens in 2006, efforts are underway to restore it. However, the Coast Guard still retains access for maintenance of the light itself.


experiment with new plants without spending a penny!

Hello fellow Capers. It's hard to believe that Fall is

here. We're looking forward to the start of the Comfort Food season of the year! We'll be cooking lots of soups, stews, gumbo, chili, and sauces; and hope to share some more recipes with you in the coming months. For you meat-eaters, don't despair. It will take more than some cold weather to shut down our grilling operation. The barbeque will still be turning out lots of savory treats even in the midst of Winter. Our neighbors probably think we are nuts grilling out in the cold!

Since we moved to Maryland, we've been on a quest to find

great pizza. We are happy to report, after many trials, we found it! Not only is it great, but we both agree it's the best pizza we've had in ages! Mangia Italian Grill, 81 Main Street, Annapolis, 410.268.1350. Their motto is, "And you thought you had high standards." We thoroughly enjoyed the "Rustica" pizza with roasted red peppers, tasty pepperoni, fresh seasonal tomato slices. delicious homemade sauce and topped with fresh, quality mozzarella. The crust was superb; crispy on the bottom, not at all doughy, excellent texture. Ben liked that the pizza crust wasn't too thick, or a paper thin charred thing. Instead the crust was just right. We felt that the pizza was reasonably priced at \$20 for a large 14" gourmet pizza that will easily feed two

people with leftovers to spare. We didn't even order the largest size pizza they offer, and we were both stuffed. Mangia is located right on the traffic circle on Main street, great for people watching! Very causal, comeas-you-are atmosphere; sports themed bar upstairs. Offers pizza by the slice on the first floor and is family friendly.

We also returned to the Sly Fox Pub, 7 Church Circle 443-482-9000. This is a fun spot in downtown Annapolis to stop for a drink and an appetizer or sandwich; and it's dog friendly! Bring the family pooch, and enjoy dining outdoors. The Pub is mostly outdoors, in a courtyard-like atmosphere; lots of umbrellas to keep the tables shady. But there is also seating available inside, actually in the base-

ment of Reynold's Tavern. The menu is limited to a few standard items, and features traditional pub fare and a few English type menu items. It's mostly sandwiches, so don't expect anything fancy. They have live entertainment most evenings and some great Happy Hour deals on drinks and appetizers. Very friendly service. And it's fun to see many patrons enjoying themselves along with their four-footed companions! We've given you the good, now here is the bad and the ugly..... We went there on a Sunday with three other family members. Our niece was served a hamburger with a bun that had a mold spot nearly the size of a dime. problem, she was very apologetic and looked appalled. 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
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
