Dear Capers,

I hope you all have started off 2017 great! We have had a busy beginning to our 2017 calendar and we expect that to continue throughout the year. In this message I would like to provide updates on our annual meeting, highlight some ongoing projects, their progress and mention some basic housekeeping items that everyone should be aware of right now.

We held our Annual Membership Meeting on Tuesday, January 10th, 2017, we had a quorum before 730Pm and a good community turnout. I am happy to report that all four candidates for the Board of Governors were elected with a majority of votes. This will allow us to return to a 9 person Board for 2017. Jennifer Vaccaro will be returning while Cheri Fairchild, Neil Macindoe and Jeffrey Roche are our newest Board members. We welcome the new energy and ideas to the Board of Governors.

All other measures on the ballot passed with a majority and by large margins for the SCBD Fee & Cap increases and FY 2018 Budget. The FY 2018 budget begins July 1st, 2017, so we will be able to carry out the goals and targets set forth in the proposed budget.

If you go to our website, [www.cscia.org](http://www.cscia.org), you will see the updates on all committee assignments for the Board of Governors. In particular I would like to highlight the Executive Committee for 2017 and their roles as follows:

- President - Beau Breedon
- Vice President - Mary Lamb
- Treasurer - Dawn Myers
- Secretary - Bill Szczytko

The project that continues to generate the most interest is the Capital Improvements Project for the Beach

Replenishment and Restoration. We are awaiting our technical memos from our Contractor, Biohabitats, Inc. and once we receive them, we will make the reports available on our website and use our Facebook page to provide the link. We hope to continue to move forward on the project with the hopes of submitting applications for permits in 2017. If you have not been following along, there are a number of required permits for a project like this to include MDE, DNR, Army Corps of Engineering, and possible others. The minimum review period is 270 days, so we hope to make progress early on this year so we can submit permits sooner than later.

Another note of interest in funding this project is that as discussed in the December Board Meeting and announced at the Membership Meeting, we have petitioned our State Senator and Delegates to include us in the Anne Arundel Delegation request for projects for matching funding from State GO Bonds. As we have said in the past we will pursue multiple sources of funding for this project. We had a successful meeting with Senator Reilly and legislative aides from his office and Delegate Saab's Office. Our bill Senate Bill 115 has been introduced. We will keep you posted and will need advocates from the community to write to our Senator and Delegates to help fight for approval and some funding this year and in the future.

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- Historic Goshen Farm and Educational Center

A few housekeeping items are also a must to begin the year and as we head into 2017.

- Yellow Maintenance Cards – They were mailed before January 1st and like every year are due before March 1st. If you did not receive one in the mail, do no wait, please contact the Office and talk with Leslie so you can get payment in before March 1st to avoid any late fees.
- If you have a current slip at the Piers, you will receive your offer for a contract the first week in February.
- We have built out an entire new Piers Management System from scratch with the use of Governor Szczytko valuable skills and dedicated volunteer work. Please if you are on the wait list, check out the updated list online on our website to see where you stand.

- Lastly, please if you use social media, Facebook in particular, check out and like our Cape St. Claire Improvement Association Page, so you can get up to date news and information regarding the community and projects in a timely fashion.

I look forward to working with our new Board of Governors and the community to make 2017 another successful year in Cape St. Claire.

## ***SIDEWALK SNOW REMOVAL***

§ 9-1-709. Snow and ice on walkways.

(a) **Prohibition.** The owner, user, or occupant of property situated on a street along which there is a paved sidewalk shall remove the snow and ice from the sidewalk fronting the property within six hours after the fall of snow except that, if it snows between 3:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m., the owner, user, or occupant shall remove the snow and ice before 11:00 a.m.

(b) **Removal by County; costs.** Whenever a person fails to comply with subsection (a), the Department of Public Works may cause the snow or ice to be removed and shall certify the cost of removal to the Controller. The costs of removal shall be paid to the County by the person who failed to remove snow or ice and the costs may be recovered by the County in an action at law.

(c) **Sanction for violation.** A person who violates any provision of this section is guilty of a misdemeanor and, on conviction, is subject to a fine not exceeding \$10.

(1985 Code, Art. 11, § 5-108)

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# **Board In Brief** *CSCIA Board Of Governors Monthly Meeting*

## JANUARY 9, 2016

President Breeden called the meeting to order at 7:32 P.M. and thanked all for attending. He said that tomorrow's Annual Meeting will have no speaker but will feature a review of the budget. A priority will be moving ahead with a town manager if the budget passes. He said maintenance fees and revenues have been coming in.

The minutes of December 12, 2016 were approved.

The Profit & Loss Statement of November 30, 2016 was approved.

### **COMMITTEE REPORTS:**

**Communication & Technology:** Governor Szczytko said the December/January Caper is on the website. He has done a lot of work on the Piers database and is laying the groundwork for mycscia.com.

**Caper:** Governor Lamb said the year in review issue was well received and advertising is going well.

**Clubhouse:** Governor Lamb is scheduling additional floor replacement and mentioned future kitchen work.

**Signboard:** Governor Lamb said a new signboard is in the works after the roadwork is completed.

**Strawberry Festival:** Governor Lamb said things are moving along.

**Budget:** Committee chair Buchet discussed the town manager position.

**Building:** Governor Zadera said things are quiet. He is following up on items that have been approved. An issue on Hillendale has been approved by the county but still requires our approval.

**Treasurer:** Governor Myers said the SCBD money has been received.

**Events:** Governor Myers is looking for help for the July 4th festivities.

**BCC:** Governor Breeden said the quarterly meeting will be January 19th and will feature a variety of speakers and topics.

**BLOA:** Governor Breeden said works continues on their SCBD.

**Covenants:** Governor Breeden said things have slowed down with some issues still outstanding.

**Piers:** Governor Breeden said that contracts are going out on February 1st. The Lake Claire project has been delayed from March until November.

**Roads:** Governor Breeden said that he has emailed the county about our frustrations with the progress on Cape St. Claire Road. The county is taking over from the contractor

who was fired. Striping is a high priority and will be dealt with as soon as it's warm enough. BG&E will have street lights in place within 30-45 days. The dead trees by the guardhouse will be dealt with in 30-45 days. The county says the paving meets standards. The water main is available for residents to connect this week. Some of the step pools need to be redone. Driveway aprons and a storm drain will be dealt with in the next 30-45 days.

**Security:** Governor Breeden said things have been relatively quiet, save for some stolen lawn ornaments. A situation at the elementary school was dealt with promptly by the police. One of our security officers is retiring and will need to be replaced.

**Beaches & Parks:** Governors Myers and Breeden met with Senator Reilly and toured the beaches regarding the restoration project. We have requested \$750,000 from the state, which we could get over the next three years. Our proposal has been accepted and we are writing it up to prepare for "bond bill days" in March. Residents need to contact our representatives and the governor to support our effort.

### **OLD BUSINESS:**

Regarding the illegal wall on our beach off River Bay Road, the county says our riparian rights are now under water and the wall is okay, but that we still have issues with the height. Governor Breeden says he is not sure where the county stands on this.

### **NEW BUSINESS:**

Richards Steinbock will look into whether the BG&E fluorescent light replacement would apply to us, as we are considered a commercial entity.

### **ADJOURNMENT:**

The meeting was adjourned at 8:06 P.M.

### **MEMBERS PRESENT:**

Governors Breeden, Lamb, Myers, Szczytko, Vaccaro and Zadera were present, as were Budget Committee chair Buchet and member Toy, along with Administrative Assistant Coble.



# GARDEN CLUB



Hello, Capers –

I wouldn't dare jinx us by saying that maybe we are having a mild winter this year...so I won't say it! Many people are enjoying typical mid-winter blooms in the Cape – witch hazel, winter jasmine, hellebores and I have to admit, there a few unexpected signs of bulbs popping up! They may be crocus, I can't remember but I'm excited anyway! There is something lovely about the winter landscape; it reminds us that things are resting and gearing up for the coming season of growth and expansion. If only ALL of us could do that! So keep your eyes peeled for those flashes of color that signify blooms or birds; they are all out there! Birds are still nibbling on seeds from plants that died off in late fall. Insects are gestating in the stems of some of those plants. "To everything, there is a season."

So, our January meeting was fun (speaking of busy!) with people planting seeds in their little plastic former spinach containers. The club supplied the seeds and the growing medium; some members have already

seen sprouts! If you garden, you can't WAIT to see those little sprouts! In a few months, those tender little seedlings may be transplanted into yards and containers and will be full-blown plants before we know it

At our February meeting, we will have Claire Jones in to discuss pollinators in the garden. She'll discuss ways to attract them and why they are important. If you'd like to come and hear her, all are welcome. Our meetings are always the first Tuesday of the month at 7:00 p.m. at the Cape St Claire Clubhouse.

Also, here's the big news: our annual Plant Sale will happen in the field near the clubhouse on Saturday May 20. Keep an eye out for more information, but you can be sure we will have plenty of Natives, vegetables and herbs and local plants from our own community. We are all very excited for this event!

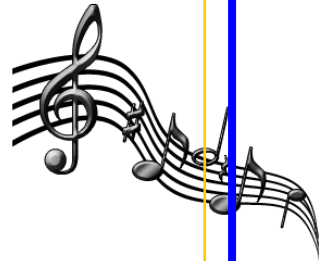

## Host Plants for Butterflies

Everyone has heard about the decline of our most iconic butterfly, the Monarch due to loss of habitat, insecticide use, predation, climate change and a major decline in their host plant-milkweed due to wide spread herbicide use. Milkweed is the only plant a monarch can lay their eggs. What many people don't realize is that most butterflies require a specific plant to lay their eggs on. These plants are known as host plants and they provide food for the caterpillar. While it is important to plant lots of nectar plants for the adult butterfly it is just as important to plant hosts plants for the babies!

Butterflies require several things to raise their young and survive as adults- host plants to lay their eggs, water source for puddling and receiving nutrients and finally nectar plants to sustain themselves in adulthood. We are going to look at the many plants you can add to your gardens to provide a nursery for our Lepidoptera.

Do you know what the Maryland State butterfly is? The Baltimore checkerspot. Unfortunately, due to a decrease in habitat and loss of their host plant, *Chelone Glabra* they are very rare in Maryland. *Chelone Glabra* turtlehead white is the host plant for Baltimore checkerspots to lay their eggs. It requires a moist, sunny spot to grow but can tolerate a little shade. If we start adding this under used herbaceous plant in our yards perhaps our state butterfly can make a comeback. According to MD Biodiversity website there are records in of Baltimore Checkerspot in almost all the counties west of the Bay. The Harford Glen Environmental Education Center in Hartford County has *Chelone Glabra* population in an enclosed area to prevent deer browsing to promote the breeding of our state butterfly. Cape residents could provide their own breeding ground by planting lots of *Chelone Glabra*!

The Baltimore Checkerspot is part of the family of butterflies known as the Nymphalidae. They are the largest family of butterflies with over 6,000 species. Other types of brushfoot butterflies include the Viceroy, Mourning Cloak and the fritillaries. The Viceroy is a monarch look alike that uses its disguise to fool predators. The host plant for this beautiful butterfly is Willow Trees-Salix. The Mourning Cloak also uses Willow trees. The Greater Fritillaries use the violet as their host plants so before you eradicate them from your yard this spring consider leaving a few for their caterpillars!

Another popular butterfly, the Pearl Crescent uses several of the smooth leaved asters as their host. Asters become a popular late fall nectar source for our migrating Monarchs. The Common Buckeye uses the common plantain that spring up in our highly trafficked areas of the lawn. One of our low ground covers plants the pussytoes plays host to the beautiful American Lady. Elms and members of the nettle family play host to the Question Mark, Eastern Comma and the Red Admiral.

One of more common butterflies I see in my garden are in the Papilionidae family-the swallowtail butterflies. There are 33 several types of swallowtails in North America. The most common to our area are the black, eastern, zebra, pipevine and spicebush. The eastern and black swallowtails use many plants in the carrot family as their host plant, including parsley, dill, fennel and celery. The Paw-Paw is the favorite for the zebra swallowtail. Paw-Paws are a small understory shrub that bears a sweet fruit that many mammals enjoy. Not surprising that the pipevine swallowtail uses *Aristolochia macrophylla* Dutchman's pipe- a woody plant with pipe shaped flowers and leaves shaped like hearts. It does give off an odor similar to rotting meat though! Avoid tropical pipevine in favor of native as they will not use tropical. Finally, the spicebush swallowtail uses another small understory with beautiful yellow fall foliage *Lindera benzoin* spice bush as well as several trees-sassafras, tulip tree, camphor, bay and ash family. All types of Swallowtail Butterflies in North America overwinter in the chrysalis stage which is why it so important to leave your flowers stalks up through the winter and let leaves lie otherwise you may be composting next year's butterflies!

The family of Lycaenidae is made up of the hairstreaks, coppers and blues. Different species of hairstreaks use hibiscus, myrtle, stag horn sumac and mistletoe as their preferred host plants. The blues will use members of the pea family, dogwoods, azaleas, holly trees and wild lupine to feed their babies. Buck wheats and smart weeds as their host.



The last of group of butterflies we find in Maryland are the sulphurs and skippers. The sulphurs typically use *Senna marilandica* and members of the pea family- Fabaceae as their host plants while skippers tend to use various grasses such as Switchgrass, Little Blue Stem, and Side oats Grama.

As you can see it is important to plant a variety of hosts plants or even leave a few "weeds" around to provide food for the caterpillars that will become the beautiful butterflies everyone loves to see in their gardens. We need to tolerate some nibbling of the foliage in order to grow the caterpillars. The more variety of host plants we offer in our gardens the more diverse of our butterfly populations will be. In planning your gardens for next spring consider adding a few host plants or leaving the plantains, violets and nettles in your yard a see what happens to your butterfly population! I saw at least 3-4 more species in my garden last summer when I added several new host plants.

While I know many of you are not thinking about gardening in December please consider the words of Josephine Nuese "Anyone who thinks gardening begins in the spring and ends in the fall is missing the best part of the whole year; for gardening begins in January with a dream" Start dreaming!
