# President's Message

#### Capers,

As we wind down the final weeks of the official summer season with the fall equinox upcoming, most of us have already returned to the fall schedule of school & work here at the beginning of September. I want to thank all the employees and volunteers who helped make the summer months of 2017 a good one for the Beaches, Parks & Piers in Cape St. Claire.

It has been one of the busiest summers in recent history, with our beaches and parks showing record number of attendees' day in and day out. Our Beach Attendants did an excellent job this summer providing residents and their guests a fun place to spend their free time and when a problem arose, being the first to contact County Emergency Services to help maintain the safety of our beaches and parks. Our grounds keeping crew accomplished a lot of maintenance projects from weeding, cutting back overgrown areas to painting fences, beach and trash pick-up weekly throughout the community along with a number of other daily tasks to keep our 30 plus acres of beaches, parks, piers and ramp operational.

We had the many volunteers from the Cape Garden Club & Cape Conservation Corps, contribute their time and skills around the community on a variety of different parcels the CSCIA owns. We appreciate all their efforts around the community over the course of the year.

I would be remiss in not mentioning the quiet and continuous effort of our secondary Anne Arundel Police Officers who work in the community 4-5 nights per week helping keep our properties safe, patrolling the community and working to make the community a better place as part of an ongoing community policing partnership.

Lastly to note, none of the Board of Governors, the CSCIA employees and volunteers would accomplish much without the hard work by our Community Administrator, Leslie. She does great work on behalf of our organization and our residents. If you see Leslie at the office or one of our 16 other part time employees out working for the Association, consider thanking them for their efforts as employees and residents in helping making the Cape a great place to live.

With fall we focus a little more on the business tasks of the Association. We have to prepare the upcoming budget that must be presented at the October Quarterly General Meeting. We have received some general suggestions for future projects, so if you believe we should be looking at certain projects in the future, you should contact the appropriate committee and offer your opinions and potential solutions. You will hear more about this in the October, November and December Caper editions.

Some of the other ongoing big projects we are working on as a Board this fall include:

- We presented a comprehensive & specific qualifications at the July Meeting to the residents that we will looking for in the process hiring of a Town Manager sometime in the first half of the calendar year of 2018. We have additional meetings regarding this specific topic as part of or work to announce the position before the year end. We will provide more information through our website as we work through this important process. This is one project that the entire Board is committed to finding the right candidate for the position next year.
- The other big ongoing project remains our Capital Improvement Projects for the Main Beach & Lake Claire Beaches. We have entered into a Project Design phase with Biohabitats, Inc. in a new contract that will lead into clarifying specifics of the project, what is possible, and what could be permitted in working with multiple Federal, State & Local agencies as required. This contract will lead us from design, starting the permit process and hopefully finding solutions that are structurally sound, minimize long term upkeep and provide the recreational space the community wants to restore, while working to improve specific environmental portions of our community property. The permitting process once we submit, will require community meetings as other opportunities for input from residents. This is at a minimum 270 days and more likely a year or more for the entire process to hopefully find us in a shovel ready position with permits in hand.
- This fall we will be also rehabbing the kitchen in our long term improvements of the Clubhouse. We are excited to see this finally take place and will greatly improve the storage, flow, look and functionality of the kitchen for our rentals which continue to generate substantial revenue for the Association to help maintain the building over time.

These are the big ticket items on the Associations plate, but expect to hear more as the year goes on, as we finalize budgets, hear more from residents and hold the October General Meeting. This is not to minimize much of the day to day work that is ongoing between the Building, Covenants, Piers, Roads and other committees of the Association. I continue to be proud of the effort given by our Board, volunteers and employees to make Cape St. Claire a great place to live. I have worked with many of our County and State Agencies over the last 5 years and we continue to be used as an example that they refer other communities to us on how we operate, conduct business and run our facilities. I believe there is always room for improvement and we will try to continue to improve the work we put out, but if these issues are important to you, we always can use more volunteers, budget committee members and board members in the future.

I hope to see you around the Cape at one of the many fall events we have on our schedule, whether it be Halloween Happenings, Cape Clean Up, the Quarterly Membership Meeting or one of the many other group fundraisers this fall being held between Goshen Farm, Cape Conservation Corps and Cape Rec Sports.

# **Board In Brief** CSCIA Board Of Governors Monthly Meeting AUGUST 14, 2017

President Breeden called the meeting to order at 7:31 P.M. He said the last month has been busy but good, and noted that the July Quarterly Meeting was well attended.

The minutes of July 10, 2017 were approved unanimously.

The P&L statement of June 30, 2017 was approved unanimously. Governor Breeden noted that this was the close of FY17. He said the non-SCBD income was up over \$23,000 this year, largely due to Clubhouse rentals and Piers income, and added that SCBD income was up, largely from savings incurred by spending some Beaches and Parks money, but setting it aside for future playground improvements.

## **COMMITTEE REPORTS**

**Covenants:** Governor Roche said there was nothing new. There are currently 46 formal complaints with none of them being remarkable.

**Cape Clean Up:** Governor Lamb said it is scheduled for October 20 and 21. Details will be in the September and October Capers.

**Halloween Happenings:** Governor Lamb said it is scheduled for October 28. Details and registration forms will be in the September and October Capers.

**Breakfast with Santa:** Governor Lamb said the event is scheduled for December 16. Details and registration forms will be in the October and November Capers.

**Signboard:** Governor Lamb is working with Mealey Signs on replacing the signboard and repairing the entrance sign.

**Caper:** Governor Lamb is still struggling with timely submittals and will make August 15 and the 15th of every month thereafter the absolute cut-off date.

**Clubhouse:** Governor Lamb said rentals have been steady and she will be working with the office to schedule renovations in the fall.

**Buildings:** Governor Zadera said there are no variance requests at this time, and there have been 44 applications to date. He mentioned several issues that have been approved or are under review.

**Technology:** Governor Szczytko said he's been working on normal updates and posting the July/August Caper.

**Membership:** Governor Szczytko noted the great turnout for the July Quarterly Meeting.

**CCC:** Governor Szczytko said the native plant sale is October 7 and the Harvest Bash is November 3.

**Beaches and Parks:** Governor Macindoe mentioned the erosion problem at Lake Claire due to the heavy rains and thanked Brad Hill and his crew for sandbagging the runoff

area.

There was some discussion of the runoff problems from Fairwinds and the County road. He also mentioned a dead tree at Lake Claire that needs to be dealt with and noted that some residents have asked for shrouds over the pier lights at Lake Claire to direct the light downward. Governor Breeden added that the Beach Attendants have been doing a great job at all areas with no major issues, and that a few will still be on the job after Labor Day.

**BCC:** Governor Breeden said the July 20 meeting featured a presentation by the DPW on the Broadneck Peninsula. He said there will be a large culvert project this fall on Baygreen Drive in Arnold that will affect traffic for 8 to 10 weeks.

**BLOA:** Governor Breeden said the contractor is finishing up the lot paving.

**Piers:** Governor Breeden said the Piers budget was approved by the Committee at August 8 meeting. It's tight but it pays for everything. He thanked Mr. Lisker for donating a ladder that has been installed at Little Magothy pier.

**Roads:** Governor Breeden said speed awareness signs have been moving around the Cape.

**Security:** Governor Breeden said there have been a couple of minor issues.

**Budget:** Committee Chair Buchet said the next meeting is August 24 and committee requests need to be in by then.

### **OLD BUSINESS**

Governor Breeden noted that the job description was discussed at the July Quarterly Meeting and that input is needed from residents and the Board in the next two weeks. There was discussion regarding the posting of the job opportunity in various places, the requirements we are seeking, the interview process, and how the town manager would work with the Board, the community, and the employees. Governor Breeden said we need to start acting on this in September.

Governor Breeden said the County will not be going forward on storm water projects at our Lake Claire Drive properties because they fear they would damage the work done by the CCC. They are looking at doing some work in other areas and Governor Breeden will meet with the County to discuss that. There was some discussion of minor issues versus major infrastructure work.

Governor Breeden said that, while we have executed the scope of the work, there are legal issues to deal with before all is finalized, and that is being worked on. We should have everything ready to go in late fall and we should have design plans back about 8 weeks after signing the contract. Then the permitting process can begin, which could take 60 to 80 weeks.

There was discussion of funding the project through loans, to go with the \$41,000 a year we have in the budget. We are still dealing with the County and State over the issue of an SCBD versus an SECD (Shore Erosion Control District) and our ability to get low interest loans. It was moved and passed that the Board look into all of this through our attorney.

There was some discussion of putting wave breakers up at Lake Claire but Governor Breeden noted that it would be subject to the permitting process. Governor Macindoe will look into it.

Governor Breeden said that we have purchased a truck for use by the maintenance crew and other Cape work.

Governor Breeden said that Whimsicality has requested the use of 3 parking spaces in the shopping center lot to put up a tent and host a grand opening event. It was moved and passed that we allow this. There was discussion of how to handle future requests and whether the Board or the BLOA should be involved. Factors like insurance and alcohol permits would need to be addressed and standardized.

Governor Breeden mentioned the recent Blue Ridge speed awareness sign and said that residents want a study of traffic and speeding between Mt. Pleasant and Chestnut Tree. He said the CSCIA would need to set up something with the County and that the County would meet with a committee of residents to start a study, which could take up to a year with 4 or 5 nights of meetings. The Board thought it was worth looking into for the residents and Governor Roche said he was willing to attend meetings on our behalf.

Governor Breeden said he has been asked to represent the Broadneck Peninsula on the Severn River bridge project. He

said that work has begun but that timelines are still in flux. Traffic will be a mess for some time and for \$25,000,000 we will get a dedicated lane from Rowe Boulevard to Route 2 and perhaps a 7 minute shorter drive from Annapolis. The goal is to have the job completed with 7 lanes open by May 25, 2018.

A motion was made and passed to allow Governor Breeden to sign documents that allow him to testify or provide documents dealing with subjects who have been banned from the shopping center and our property for shoplifting.

Governor Szczytko brought up the idea of selling ad space on the website to go along with the advertising in the Caper. He noted that we have been getting close to 200 individuals a week visiting the site. This led to some discussion of where and how to do it, whether the site can be used for commercial purposes, and what the revenue would be used for. The Technology and Caper committee chairs will discuss it further.

### COMMENTS

Becky Benner of the Garden Club said that Club meetings will resume in September on the first Tuesday of every month. She added that she has heard comments from people attending Clubhouse functions noting how nice the Clubhouse looks and what a great venue it is.

### **ADJOURNMENT**

The meeting was adjourned at 9:08 P.M.

## **MEMBERS PRESENT**

Sometimes the most ordinary things turn out to be the most extraordinary things... So it is with the Goshen Farm House front porch. When General George Washington resigned his commission as Commander-in-Chief of the Continental Army on December 23, 1783 in Annapolis—then capital of the United States of America—that front porch was a new porch and the Goshen Farm House was the latest addition to an already old farm called Leonard's Neck that stretched to the Cape St. Claire Main Beach.

Built and owned by John Pettibone Gardiner, by 1798 the house (and the porch) were inherited by Richard Pettibone Gardiner who, by 1812, had 5 grown sons. Imagine that on a mild September evening in 1814, some of those sons may have sat on that porch watching as the 51 ships of the British Fleet sailed north on the Chesapeake Bay to attack the city of Baltimore at Fort McHenry.

(A lot of things can happen to a porch in 234 years—Yes, the porch has been redone more than a few times, but it has many stories to tell.) Please sit on our porch in our 234 year old Farm House and imagine the scenes and activities that occurred through the years.


# Anyone counting on merit aid--on grants and scholarships awarded regardless of need-- should take the following to heart.

- Grades matter most. And though high school may look like 8 semesters spread over 4 years, for the college-bound it's more like 6 semesters over 3. Think of our rising seniors who'll be applying early in the fall. First-semester grades won't appear on their transcripts until next February, well after the Early-Action notification date. Secondsemester results won't be posted until well after the admissions deposit deadline of May 1. So the grades juniors are earning right now could well be the last set an admissions committee will see before deciding their fate. By this timetable, a sophomore's college transcript will be 2/3 compete come June, not 1/2. Now is the time, kids!
- Flexibility is key in the search for merit aid. "We're looking for a generous scholarship" and "We're not applying to any school more than 2 hours from our house," are inconsistent statements. Don't work against yourself by being arbitrary.
- Don't hem yourself in geographically. The Midwest is dotted with colleges that will start you off with a smaller price tag than their coastal competitors. So is the South. A reputable college counselor can help you find such places. Why not take a look and see what's out there?
- In the quest for merit aid, stay flexible on matters of size, make a visit, and see for yourself if the school could work. (You'd be surprised how a nice scholarship can shrink a school that seemed to big, or expand one that looked too small!)
- The reality is that financial aid works in ways that are counterintuitive. What looks more expensive may well turn out not to be so. What's the cost differential between a state school that runs 25K a year and makes no award, and a private college that costs 50K but comes up with 25K in aid? Suggestion: Try both types and see how you do.
- We may "know what we like", but it's also true that we like what we already know. There are fine schools out there you may not have heard of. Don't dismiss. Be open to possibility!
- College lists consisting of a bunch of hyper-selective schools accompanied by a single unwanted "safety" aren't helpful. Reach, don't flail. That ugly duckling you have no intention of attending provides no safety at all. In the end, Teddy Roosevelt had it right: "Keep your eyes on the stars, and your feet on the ground."
- Find some joy in the process. There are awesome schools out that are relative "bargains" in this crazy market. Please let me know if I can help you find one!

# Why Plant in the Fall?

If you think the time to garden is over, think again. Fall is the best time to plant including trees, shrubs and perennials. By planting in the fall you will get your shrubs, trees and perennials off to a faster start in the spring. The soil will still be holding onto the summer's warmth; which will encourage root growth up until the first freeze. The plants are no longer working on making leaves, flowers, berries and fruits so all of their energy goes to establishing roots. Another advantage to fall planting is the lower temperatures will mean the plants don't have to contend with heat and drought. Finally, there are usually lots of great deals as the nurseries are trying to clear out their inventory. Even if the plants don't look perfect, leaves are dropping, flowers are drooping, but the real action is in their root system.

Fall is a great time to lose some of the lawn and turn it into a new garden bed, filled with native plants that will greatly improve wildlife diversity in your yard. The standard green, monoculture lawn not only excludes wildlife from your landscape, it consumes large amounts of water, is high maintenance and comes with a HUGE carbon footprint. By eliminating a portion of your lawn you will be gaining back some of your leisure time, time that can be spent observing the abundance of wildlife your new garden will attract and improving the health of the environment. Don't just plant any plants-plant more natives! Use this time to add native plants that have co-evolved over millions of years with our native fauna. Native plants offer a rich and diverse source of food for birds and other wildlife. Did you know that 93% of birds feed their babies insects? A native Oak tree will support over 530 different species of caterpillars, while a non-native Gingko supports 0-3 species. A Carolina Chickadee needs over 9,000 caterpillars to raise just 1 clutch of babies. Alien, ornamental trees and shrubs offer little or no benefit to our increasingly fragile ecosystems. They need native plants in order to survive and thrive!

Of course by now we all know some of those dreaded fall chores are not necessary so you will have plenty of extra time to plant and get a jump on spring! What chores can you cross off the to-do list before even getting started? For one thing leave the leaves! By raking, blasting, bagging and sending the leaves to the landfill you are not only destroying the environment but robbing the garden of nutrients and destroying next year's butterflies, moths and other good bugs. Yard debris accounts for 33 million tons of solid waste per year-13% of the total generated according to the U.S. EPA. Leaves form natural mulch that can both

suppress weeds and fertilize the soil. The leaves also provide much needed habitat for wildlife. The leaf litter provides food, shelter and nesting materials for frogs, toads, turtles, birds, mammals and invertebrates. There are several things you can do with the leaves rather than send them to the landfill.

Leave them where the fall, mulch over them with a mulching mower, rake them into your garden as mulchshredding them into a finer texture so they will break down easier, combine them with grass clippings and other green material to make nutrient rich compost to spread in the garden in the spring. You can also use the leaves along with branches, and sticks to make brush piles to shelter neighborhood wildlife, and finally if you are like most of us in the Cape you probably have more than enough so share them with a friend or neighbor that isn't lucky enough to have an abundance of this free nutrient rich mulch!

Are you wondering why you did not see as many butterflies and other beneficial bugs in your yard this summer? It could be because your garden was too neat. We have a tendency to want to go and "tidy" up the garden in the fall by cutting down all the stems, but those stems house many overwintering bugs. It is best to let them stand through the winter and even late into spring to give insects time to emerge. If you must clean up in the spring try to leave 12-18" standing -once the new stems and leaves begin to emerge you won't see the brown stems from last year and the bugs will be able to make their way out. Leaving

those stalks up also offers us an opportunity to enjoy the garden all year, winter interest is the beautiful display those spent flower and seed heads and stalks offer us. The winter sun reflecting off of them, or glistening in the soft snow. We can sit back and appreciate the deep red stems of a red dogwoods, dark browns of the herbaceous plants , pale yellows of switchgrass, dark, almost black inkberries, or the clean white bark of a paper birch. If we change the way we see "pretty" you will begin to see the beauty all around you. Our gardens should not just be what are aesthetically pleasing to us but what benefits the ecosystem as a whole.

One of the biggest questions I get asked is where can I go purchase natives plants? The best answer to that question is **RIGHT HERE IN YOUR NEIGHBORHOOD!** Cape Conservation Corps is going to host their first ever Fall Native Plant Sale on October 7<sup>th</sup> from 9am-12pm- in the field behind the clubhouse. Not only will we have hand selected native plants for the soil and light conditions of Cape but they will be reasonably priced so you can easily afford to start that new garden or add to your existing gardens! We will also have on hand many local experts including



Master Gardeners, Watershed Stewards and Master Naturalists to answer questions, offer advice and educate. The day will also include several guest speakers on a variety of topics.

There are also several Native Plant nurseries in the area you can visit this fall. Chesapeake Natives in Upper Marlboro, Adkins Arboretum in Ridgely (near Tuckahoe State Park), Herring Run Nursery in Baltimore.


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# **Anne Arundel County** Launches 3-1-1 Customer Service Program - Call or **Click for Quick Response**

Please dial 9-1-1 for emergencies and medical assistance. Citizens can also download the mobile app through the App Store (iPhone) and Google Play (Android). Only a simple signup process is required. Just hit the magnifying glass and search for "Arundel 311."

The mobile platform, through the See-Click-Fix application, allows citizens to report a lost pet, a pothole, a missed trash collection, traffic signs, illegal signs, and many other issues. Using your mobile device, you can take a picture, set a location, and receive updates on the response to your issue.



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
