Don't forget to mark your calendars for the April Quarterly meeting, which as of right now, is still scheduled for April 21st 7:30pm. We scheduled it early this year because of the primary elections being held on the 28th, however, the primary election has been moved to June 2nd 2020 because of the Coronavirus outbreak.

Please mail your money to the office ASAP, or use the drop box, and be sure to include your vehicle information. 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Board In Brief CSCIA Board Of Governors Monthly Meeting MARCH 9, 2020

President Szczytko called the meeting to order in the Cox meeting room of the clubhouse at 7:33 pm.

He reported that Steiny has submitted his resignation. The Board has thanked him for his 14 years of service and is working on finding replacements to cover his duties.

Beach project – permitting is close, funding is here, and some payments have been made. There will be social blasts to announce it when work is about to start.

The minutes of February 11, 2020 were reviewed and approved.

The P&L statement of January 31, 2020 was reviewed and approved.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Town Manager: Town Manager Anderson reported that the outstanding vegetation management plan is progressing well. The bidding process for mowing of CSCIA properties is underway. The CSCIA work truck was taken in for repairs and recall work. Paperwork for water testing at Main Beach and Lake Claire swim areas has been submitted to the County. The yardarm for the flagpole has arrived and installation will occur soon. The County step pond project on Lake Claire Drive is still underway. The Cape St Claire Road welcome sign is complete and awaiting final inspection. Caper articles are due March 12. Water at the piers is to be turned on March 23, paving of lower part of the Deep Creek lot is scheduled for March 24, portable toilets are to arrive April 1, the piers workday is April 11, pier slip contracts are due March 20. He is working with the piers administrator to make sure all finger piers are in the system and labeled correctly. He has had questions regarding building permits, illegal home businesses and a house in poor condition that the Health Dept has inspected. The SCBD check from the county has been received. He asked that any governors in charge of a budget line item notify him of any conflicts or requests in time for the budget meeting next month. He also asked that governors review the website for any changes or omissions.

Buildings: Governor Roche reported that we are entering the busy season with several new homes being built.

Events: Governor Fairchild reported that plans are underway for July 4th.

Beaches and Parks: Governor Macindoe reported that the beaches have been quiet. Scouts have approached him for project ideas. Governor Breeden reported that information for hiring beach attendants and that the minimum age has been reduced to 16. Anyone under 18 will have to have a work permit.

Budget: Mike Buchet announced that the next budget meeting on March 11 at 7 pm.

BCC: Broadneck Council of Communities held its quarterly meeting on February 27. Town Manager Anderson and Governor Myers attended. Reviews from BBC board say it was well attended and there was positive feedback about the presentations from elected officials and judges. Plans

are being made for the April 23 meeting with a Board of Education representative. Governor Myers reported that the County wants to encourage those on septic systems to convert to sewer and are hoping for state funding. The Cape is already on the sewer system but communities around us on the water are not and that affects our beach water quality.

Piers: Contracts are coming in, next meeting is March 10.

Security: Governor Breeden reported that he is working with the police with some problematic areas.

Clubhouse: Governor Lamb reported she will meet with the Town Manager regarding satisfaction with the current cleaning contractor. There was an incident during a recent rental in which the dumpster corral fence was damaged.

Caper: Governor Lamb reported things are going well with the Caper and she will send a reminded or the due date of the 12th. Non-paying submitters are asked to keep article to 1-1½ pages keep costs down. There was a recommendation that instead of a link to a historical aerial photo of the old Cape St Claire road, that the photo itself be printed. Governor Szczytko replied that the photo is the property of historicalaerials.com, not CSCIA, and therefore we cannot print it.

Easter Egg Hunt: Governor Lamb reported all going smoothly for event on April 4, Whimsicality is handing out tickets and collecting eggs, the fire department will bring the Bunny.

Strawberry Festival: Governor Lamb reported that planning is in full swing.

OLD BUSINESS

Governor Lamb reported the county has suggested the use of pavers to make a patio for the clubhouse instead of a deck to reduce grading and disturbance. She will revisit that and get bids.

Governor Breeden reported the Green Holly to Bay Dale phase has two intersections to complete and it may officially open within the next two weeks. Plantings will occur after opening. The phase from 7-11 to Sandy Point is still in the development, design and land acquisition stage. The design for the phase from Bay Dale to Peninsula Farm Road is 95% complete.

Governor Breeden reported that permits have all been submitted and in process. The county and the Chesapeake Bay Trust were out in January and after the \$298,000 grant award, they are interested in funding there also. Site 1 will cost less than planned due to reduction of the cobble bar, so we may be able to expand the project or borrow less. The federal grant will not be awarded until August so that was not included in Site 2 as it is too far in the future to count on. Governor Breeden thanked Town Manager Anderson for doing a great job filling in for him, pulling together grants and representing CSCIA. Fairwinds Marina has offered their support after a presentation by Alliance of the Chesapeake. Governors Szczytko and Breeden commended Alliance of the Chesapeake and Abby, our partner, for their support. Alliance will want to have a conversation with CSCIA regarding promoting the story of the partnership of private community,

A Message from The Town Manager

With the Spring months upon us and summer around the corner, I would like to remind my fellow neighbors to be cautious while driving through the streets of Cape. Children will be out and about in full-force and you are more likely than ever to see a distracted child chasing after a run-away ball or riding their bicycles through our neighborhood. Slow down when driving through our neighborhood and be extra aware of what's going on around you. Please remind your children that they have a responsibility to be aware of oncoming cars as well, and to be extra careful when they are in the street. Remind children that walking in the street or through intersections while texting on electronics is just as distracting and dangerous as texting and driving.

Maintenance fee renewals were due by March 1st. If you have not turned yours in, please do so as soon as possible and be aware a late fee will be incurred. Double check you have submitted your vehicle information as well. Sticker and Guest Passses will not be mailed out without vehicle information being provided first, you can mail a check in or use the drop box, which is located next to the office door. We accept cash and checks payable to CSCIA.

We are currently taking applications for Beach Attendants at this time. This year we have lowered the minimum age to 15. The primary duties will involve screening visitors for access eligibility and logging visitor statistics as well as enforcing Beaches and Parks policies. Shifts are mainly on weekends and afternoons and will start in mid to late May and run until Labor

Day weekend. Weekend availability is key and employees must be able to work on Memorial Day Weekend, Strawberry Festival 6/6, and the evening Independence Day 7/4. If you are interested please come by the office and fill out an application this month.

Portable restrooms will make their return after COVID-19 gathering restrictions are removed. Water will be turned on at Deep Creek piers and Lake Claire piers as well.

Piers work day is still scheduled April 18th as of now. We will meet at the boat ramp at 9:00 am.

Our next Quarterly Membership Meeting is scheduled Tuesday, April 21st at 7:30 pm. There is a good chance this date could change, especially with the Primary Elections being postponed. We may have to move the Quarterly Membership Meeting to April 28th or even later.

Primary Elections have been rescheduled for Tuesday, June 2nd. Be sure to vote.

Goshen Farm: Becky Benner announced the open house scheduled for April 25 from 10 am – 4 pm. There will be children's activities, tours of the house, gardens and shallow water wildlife pond. On March 21 as part of Anne Arundel County's celebration of Maryland Day weekend, 9 historic signs will be placed throughout the county. Goshen Farm is the only that will have a public unveiling, at 3pm.

Cape Conservation Corps: Brad Knopf announced Project CleanStream is scheduled for April 4. The Weed Warrior kickoff party will occur March 13 at 5:30 pm to celebrate the weekly weed cleaning of the Serene Ravine at 1036 Lake Claire Drive. There will be planting of the ravine, along with the help of some Girl Scouts, from 9-noon on April 25. The speaker series will feature Chris Packs on April 17 at the

clubhouse at 7 pm. He introduced Replant Anne Arundel, a co-op between the county, watershed stewards, the Alliance and the Helena Foundation that will be planting trees throughout the county.

Governor Breeden informed the board of a Capital newspaper article by Maureen Thomas about Olivia West, a local Girl Scout who helped with plantings at Lake Claire. It was a good article about involvement of youth, CCC, and the Cape.

A motion was made that the meeting be adjourned to a closed session and unanimously approved. The March 9, 2020 meeting of the CSCIA Board of Governors was adjourned to a closed session at 8:25 pm.

HISTORIC GOSHEN FARM AND EDUCATIONAL CENTER

The History of Goshen Farm and Other News

Ft. Madison was a masonry fort designed to hold 13 guns and one company of soldiers. Another fort, Fort Nonsense, was an earthen fort, most likely constructed as an outer defense of Ft. Madison. Remnants of Ft. Nonsense are the only remaining evidence of the defenses of Annapolis during the war of 1812.

Richard Gardiner served 15 days at Ft. Madison during September 1814. John Gardiner served at Ft. Madison and Sandy Point during 1813 and 1814. They were joined by many of their neighbors and extended family members. On the list of militia stationed at Ft. Madison during September 1814 are Merrikens, Duvalls, Stinchcombs, Brices, Mackubins, and Pumphrey's, among many others (names we still see in this area today).

Luckily for the defenders of Annapolis, Admiral Cochrane was fixated on the destruction of Baltimore, which he considered a "nest of pirates".

On September 12 the British landed at North Point where the Americans fought a delaying action during which the beloved British General Robert Ross was killed. The British encountered a much different enemy than the one they faced at Bladensburg. By the time they reached Hampstead Hill (Current day Patterson park) they faced approximately 10,000 troops and 100 cannon. In the lead up to the battle, militia, regular troops, and private citizens flooded into the city from the surrounding countryside in order to defend the city.

Meanwhile, commercial vessels had been sunk across the Patapsco to prevent a landing and the bombardment of Ft. McHenry had failed.

The British sailed away and according to G.R. Gleig, came close enough to the shore o witness the people once again stirred into a panic around Annapolis.

The following was printed in the Maryland Gazette: "Annapolis abandoned — Most of the inhabitants have left town and every article of any value is removed, so that should the British make an attempt to possess the place, which they may easily take having no military force to defend Annapolis, they will find nothing. Letter from Maynadier, Sept. 16, 1814."

The British made no attempt to land, and moved on to New Orleans, where they experienced further defeat at the hands of Andrew Jackson.

On December 24, 1814, the Treaty of Ghent was signed, ending the war of 1812. Peace returned to the Chesapeake and lasted for over 40 years. The Gardiners, along with their neighbors, got back to the business of farming.

John Gardiner eventually married and moved away to Baltimore. Richard Gardiner Jr. became sole owner of Goshen in 1839. There is no record of him ever getting married or having children. He died in 1847 and left his estate to Thomas Jefferson Hall, beginning a new era in the history of Goshen Farm.



According to Doug Tallamy, author and entomologist at the University of Delaware if we convert just 1/2 of the turf lawns covering our country we could create the largest National park in the U.S. We would have the largest National Park- bigger than the combined parks of the Everglades, Yellowstone, Yosemite, Grand Teton, Canyonlands, Mount Rainer, North Cascades, Badlands, Olympic, Sequoia, Grand Canyon, Denali, and the Great Smoky Mountains National Parks! He would call it Homegrown National Park. Over 40 million acres of turf grass cover the United States (roughly the size of New England), our small state of Maryland alone has 1.1 million acres. (Tallamy, 2020). In his new book, *Nature's Best Hope*, Tallamy tells how and why we should be removing the turf and planting native plants- shrubs, trees, herbaceous perennials, ground covers. The plants that our native fauna has co-evolved with for hundreds of thousands of years.

The numbers say it all- insects pollinate over 87% of all plants and 90% of all flowering plants, 97% of terrestrial birds rely on caterpillars and insects to feed their babies. Native plants are vital to sustain caterpillars with specific species being far superior (Tallamy & Shropshire 2009). The *Quercus* (oak), *Prunus* (cherry) and *Salix* (willow) can host hundreds of species of caterpillars while introduced species such as *Cladrastis* (yellowwood) and *Empetrum* (crowberry) have almost no record of hosting caterpillars.

We can start small removing the turf. I don't think it is realistic to go out and rip up half of your lawn all at once. You can implement gradual changes, small steps. I would suggest carving out a small "island" garden in the middle of a big patch of grass you have or setting up a small shade garden under an oak tree. By adding some shade tolerant plants and allowing at least some of the oak leaves a place to linger you will be creating the perfect habitat for overwintering insects. Since the oak tree, as superior host plant that can support 534 species of caterpillars, it is important to let their leaves lie. The soil beneath the tree can become somewhat compacted



over time so that a caterpillar looking for loose soil to borrow into will have to travel a great distance to find an ideal spot. Or the caterpillars looking for leaf litter to spin their cocoon in will find no leaves if you have raked them all away and hauled them from your property. After munching through the oak leaves as a caterpillar many of them drop to the ground to pupate. They need the cover of the oak leaves and native plants in order to be protected. The leaves will break down overtime creating a richer, loose soil that the caterpillars and other insects will find much more useful. I would plant *Heuchera Americana* Alumroot in mass for a stunning display, or *Tiarella cordifolia* foamflower mixed with *Polystichum acrostichoides* Christmas fern for some evergreen coverage. If you decide to carve out an island garden in a sunny spot of your yard you could use *Penstemon digitalis* beardtongue, *Echinacea purpurea* coneflowers, *Asclepias tuberosa* butterfly weed (milkweed), *Eupatorium dubium* "little Joe" Joe-Pye weed, *Solidago sp.* goldenrod and *Aster laevis* smooth aster. This combo would offer continuous blooms from early spring right through fall. It is important to always have something in bloom for the pollinators. The late season asters and goldenrod will be an excellent source of energy for fall migrators such as the monarch. As we know the monarch requires milkweed as a host plant but it also needs a nectar source in the fall to begin the migration with lots of energy.

While I do recommend the use of mostly (ideally all) native plants I understand that is not the possible in most cases. What I am advocating is for you to start educating yourselves on the importance of native plants and begin to select natives when you are starting a new garden or replacing plants in an existing garden. Look for a native that will work in your conditions. Learn and understand how that native plant will contribute to biodiversity and enhance the ecosystem. What is its importance in the food web? I am not asking you to rid your yard of all non-natives but consider getting rid of the ones that can be become invasive such a butterfly bush, nandina, barberry, non-native wisteria, English ivy and vinca.

Instead of shopping for your plants at big box stores look for local native plant sales and nurseries. It may be a little more effort to get to them but they are well worth it. I recommend Chesapeake Natives in Upper Marlboro. They will have their first open house of the season on March 30th. Check out their website for additional dates or to schedule an appointment to visit them. They also have a list of their available plants so you can pre-plan your trip! They onlysell Chesapeake Bay Watershed provenance Local-Ecotype-Native* (LEN) Plants. http://chesapeakenatives.org/plant-sales/

Another great place to find native plants is Adkins Arboretum in Ridgely, just off 404 on the Eastern Shore. They have their open house on April 24th-26thand thereafter will be selling plants during the days that the visitor center is open. Check out their website here https://adkins.donorshops.com/shop-for-plants.

And finally since fall is the best time to plant you can Save the Date for Cape Conservation Corps Fall Plant Fest and Native Plant Sale. September 9thWe will have many experts on hand from Master Gardeners, Master Naturalists, Watershed Stewards Academy, Author and native plant and wildlife expert Nancy Lawson, as well as Cape St Claire resident and native landscape designer Chris Pax. Check out Chris' website https://www.annapolisnativelandscape.com/ to sign up for her newsletters, online classes, and to see how she help

you with your small scale garden designs at affordable prices. Or come check Chris out in person. CCC will host Chris Pax as our next guest speaker on April 17that the Cape St Claire clubhouse starting at 7 pm –doors open at 6:30pm. See the top section for more information about the even.

My last recommendation to keep learning more about creating your own backyard connection to nature is to read Doug Tallamy's new book "Nature's Best Hope". I promise it will change the way you think about your yard and your responsibility to those with no voice!

HEALTH NOTES: Fibromyalgia



What is fibromyalgia?

Fibromyalgia is a disorder in which there is musculoskeletal pain throughout the body accompanied by fatigue, sleep, memory and mood issues.

Researchers believe that fibromyalgia increases painful sensations by affecting the way your brain processes pain signals.

Symptoms can sometimes begin after physical trauma, surgery, infection or significant psychological stress. In other cases, symptoms gradually build up over time with no specific triggering event.

Women are more likely to develop fibromyalgia than are men. Many people who have fibromyalgia also have tension headaches, temporomandibular joint (TMJ) disorders, irritable bowel syndrome, anxiety and depression.

Symptoms of fibromyalgia may include:

- Widespread pain. The pain associated with fibromyalgia often is described as a constant dull ache that has lasted for at least three months. The pain usually occurs on both sides of your body and above and below your waist.
- Fatigue. People with fibromyalgia often wake in the morning feeling tired, even though they report sleeping for long periods of time. Sleep is often disrupted by pain, and many patients with fibromyalgia have other sleep disorders, such as restless legs syndrome and sleep apnea.
- Cognitive difficulties. A symptom commonly referred to as «fibro fog» impairs the ability to focus, pay attention and concentrate on mental tasks.

Diagnosis

There is no definitive test for fibromyalgia. A diagnosis is made when a patient has the symptoms of the disease. Frequently, other conditions are ruled out before making the diagnosis. Sometimes, people are misdiagnosed with fibromyalgia when they actually have another similar condition.

Fibromyalgia can also frequently co-exists with other painful conditions, such as:

- Irritable bowel syndrome
- Migraine and other types of headaches
- Interstitial cystitis or painful bladder syndrome
- Temporomandibular joint disorders

Causes

It isn't known what causes fibromyalgia, but it probably involves a variety of factors working together. These may include:

- Genetics. Because fibromyalgia tends to run in families, there may be certain genetic mutations that may make you more susceptible to developing the disorder.
- Infections. Some illnesses appear to trigger or aggravate fibromyalgia.
- Physical or emotional trauma. Fibromyalgia can sometimes be triggered by a physical trauma, such as a car accident, or psychological stress.

Risk factors

Risk factors for fibromyalgia include:

- Your sex. Fibromyalgia is more common in women than in men.
- Family history. You may be more likely to develop fibromyalgia if a relative also has the condition.
- Other disorders. If you have osteoarthritis, rheumatoid arthritis or lupus, you may be more likely to develop fibromyalgia.

Complications

The pain and lack of sleep associated with fibromyalgia can interfere with your ability to function at home or on the job. The frustration of dealing with an often-misunderstood condition also can result in depression and health-related anxiety.

Treatment

While there is no cure for fibromyalgia, a variety of things, in addition to medications can help control symptoms including exercise, relaxation and stress-reduction measures. Good nutrition and adequate rest are also essential. Medications such as Ibuprofen (anti inflammatory), antidepressants and lyrica (for nerve pain) and sleeping medications such as melatonin have been known to be helpful.

Outlook

Although there is no known cure, the symptoms caused by fibromyalgia can be controlled. Hopefully the future will bring us now tools to help with this condition.

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
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
