Board In Brief CSCIA Board Of Governors Monthly Meeting

APRIL 12, 2021

In attendance were: Governors Jeff Roche, Bill Szczytko, Dawn Myers, Beau Breeden, Mary Lamb, Cheri Fairchild, Lisa Schmidt, Jerome Zadera and Neil Macindoe, Michele Shipley, Town Manager Ryan Anderson, Budget committee member Charlie Moore and guests Becky Benner, Brian Buchner, and Philippe Ourisson.

President Roche called the meeting to order at 7:31 pm and expressed gratitude for the positive reaction from residents to the beach restoration project and for the return of funding for the Site #2. He introduced a variance request for reduced setbacks for a house to be built on a smaller than normal lot. House plans will not be submitted until a decision is reached on the variance because the size of the structure will depend on the setback. The potential homeowner introduced himself and explained his reasons for requesting the variance before he completes purchase of the lot.

Minutes of the March 8, 2021 BOG meeting were reviewed and unanimously approved.

The P&L statement for February had not been finalized due to health concerns. The preliminary report was reviewed.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Beaches and Parks: Governor Macindoe reported that beach attendants are being hired, the beaches have been busy and that there have been requests for trash cans at Lake Claire. Governor Breeden said that more portable toilets will be delivered before Memorial Day. He reminded everyone that the beaches and parks are to be family friendly and asked that everyone be respectful, act appropriately and watch their language. No fires or alcohol permitted. The new jetties create an additional danger and there are no lifeguards, so he cautioned against walking on the jetties or jumping into the water near them. He is working with the Little Magothy River Association to caution the public about the dangers of jetties.

Broadneck Council of Communities: Governor Breeden announced the BCC is busy with legislative issues and development plans for the county and the Bay Bridge. The BCC is contacting congressmen and federal agencies that have to approve the new bridge span location to express concern that proper studies have not been conducted on the expense to expand Rt 50 vs other alternatives. They hope to have someone consider looking at ways to alleviate traffic by using another location instead of people who live in this area having to deal with it all. He asked that everyone look into the county General Development Plan and comment because exemptions and variances are being passed and if we want to affect the regional planning we need to act.

Budget: Governor Zadera asked that committees make any requests that need to be addressed before the end of the fiscal year. Charlie Moore announced the next budget meeting to be held April 29.

Building: President Roche said that the process is running smoothly with Town Manager Ryan and Office Administrator Coble assisting in addressing missing information. New houses continue to be built and existing houses improved.

Caper: Governor Lamb requested that Caper articles be kept to one page to keep costs down.

Clubhouse: Governor Lamb said there were several rentals in April, fewer scheduled for May. A weeping cherry tree will be planted at the clubhouse in memory of a longtime Cape Carden Club member and aerobics participant.

Covenants: President Roche and Governor Fairchild stated that residents have been notifying the office of potential covenant infractions and thanked Town Manager Anderson for following up on them.

Events: Governor Schmidt announced the Cape Swap on April 18. July 4th events are uncertain. Governor Lamb reported the Strawberry Festival will hopefully be held August 28. There was a lot of positive feedback from the Easter Egg Hunt and thanked the CSC Fire Department for their help with the visit from the Easter Bunny. There are no definite plans for a Cape Clean Up.

Legislative: Governor Myers reported the legislation submitted by Delegate Bagnall and Senator Reilly passed, replacing the \$250,000 for Site 2 of the beach project. Other bills addressing riparian rights and notification of permits have not passed.

Piers: Governor Breeden reported that most slip contracts have been renewed, moves are underway for those who were offered and accepted different slips and soon the available slips will be offered to the waitlist. Permits for replacing pilings (this spring) and replacing the decking on the Deep Creek Large pier (this winter) have been obtained. He thanked Piers Administrator Williams for her work. Piers committee meetings are held first Tuesdays. Attendees expressed interest in social gatherings. A large dead tree was removed along the bulkhead area and damage it caused to stairs was repaired.

Security: No report

Technology: President Szczytko reported that he uploaded the Caper to the website and the Facebook page.

Town Manager: Town Manager Anderson reported that the 4th overall payment on the beach restoration project has been made. Ecological Restoration & Management will be planting 4,400 plants at Site 1. The large dead tree at Deep Creek was taken down, and two trees are to be planted to close out the vegetation management plan. Two watershed steward candidates plan projects at Deep Creek and Lake Claire. Some former beach attendants will return for 2021 and interviews are scheduled with applicants. Attendants start mid-May, and at the main beach there will be one at the parking lot and one at the gate. Paperwork for the county Mosquito Control program has been submitted. Spraying is to start as needed at the end of May. County Water Quality testing will also begin then. Aerobics continues at the clubhouse on Thursdays. There were rentals of the clubhouse in April. The process to obtain a one-day liquor license is back and has changed somewhat. One can apply online but must make an appointment to pay by check in person at the county offices. The clubhouse is operating with the conditions of 50% capacity, masks, and the modified

A Message from The Town Manager



Capers,

With warmer weather approaching and hopefully more restrictions being lifted, I want to remind everyone of a couple important things. When at the beach or community areas, please make sure you leave the area litter free! If you see trash, please pick it up. Let's take pride in our community! Please also slow down while driving through the neighborhood. Lots of children are at play and after being cooped up for so long, we will have a lot of people out and about.

All the beautiful trees and flowers are blooming and the grass is starting to finally grow. Here are a few lawn care tips for the growing season:

Most importantly, bare soil must be covered with turfgrass or other vegetation. Bare soil exposure directly contributes to soil erosion and surface runoff of fertilizer nutrients, sediment, and pesticides polluting our local watershed. Maintaining turfgrass is one of the easiest ways to prevent this. The University of Maryland Extension office recommends Tall Fescue as the species of choice for our state.

- -Mow Tall: Aim for 4 inches tall. Only mow shorter if the grass starts to fall over on itself. This will also help block out sunlight from weeds and encourage deeper root growth.
- Rule: Never remove more than one third of the total height of your grass in a single mowing.
- -Keep Sharp: Sharpen your lawn mower blade at least once

per season to help avoid browning of the grass tips and promote disease resistance.

- -Fertilize in the Fall: "Fertilize in the Fall, if at all." If you have to, fall is the best time to fertilize your lawn.
- -Recycling/mulching your grass clippings all season long amounts to about one fertilizer application and reduces waste.

GREEN stickers should be on vehicles starting May 1st. Guest Passes are for parking only. Visitors must be accompanied by the Cape Resident to visit Cape beaches and parks.

Last month I mentioned the rules regarding the 60 day limit for portable storage units. This month I'd like to remind our residents that all vehicles must be tagged with a registration plate and current validation stickers displayed in accordance with County Zoning Ordinances . This not only includes cars but also trailers and boats. Oversized vehicles that are over 10,000 pounds can not be parked in a residential area.

Our next Quarterly Membership Meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, April 27th at 7:30 pm will be virtual again. We will post the link on our webpage.

cleaning contract. The building was pressure washed, the Cape St Claire flag added to the flagpole, and general annual spring maintenance performed at the main beach. The clubhouse security camera system needs replacing. There was a good turnout at the piers meeting and the next will be held May 4. Boats are to be in slips by June 1. The county dredging program is planned for October at Deep Creek and CSCIA is included in the permit, but funding needs to be worked out before a decision is made whether to have dredging done at the pier. Piling replacement is to occur at the end of April. All 4 security positions are filled and 24/30 dates in are covered. The Business Lot Owners Association has paid their insurance and security contributions. The Cape St Claire Swim Club is requesting a copy of the lease and is aware of their outstanding fees. Maintenance fee cards were due March 1, stickers must be on vehicles parked on Cape properties starting May 1. The unemployment insurance rate for CSCIA increased due to law changes.

OLD BUSINESS

Governor Breeden reported the \$250,000 grant from Maryland for Waterway Improvement will be available this fall. Plantings at Site #1 are being done professionally to comply with the requirements by the Chesapeake Bay Trust. Volunteers can do maintenance plantings later. Site #2

construction is not part of the Nov 15 deadline for hunting season. Tentative dates for construction are Nov 1 - Dec 3. Contracts need to be finalized and funding in place before construction. The official ribbon cutting to celebrate Site #1 will be Apr 13, with representatives from government, Alliance of the Chesapeake, BioHabitats, Chesapeake Bay Trust and US Fish & Wildlife Service, but we cannot invite the public due to the 25 person limit for gatherings.

President Roche reported on the unpermitted stairs built near Deep Creek. He is working with the homeowner and the County to get the proper permits completed. A survey of the "paper alleys", the various strips of CSCIA owned land around the Cape, is in the title search process now. The surveyor's report should be available by the next Board meeting.

NEW BUSINESS

No new business.

COMMENTS

Becky Benner announced that the Goshen Farm Open House will be held virtually on Apr 24 from 10 am-2 pm live on Facebook. There will be discussions and tours of the farmhouse, Hoop House (greenhouse), gardens, pond and


apiary. The following Wednesday will be a fundraiser with Broadneck Grill, with 10% of sales from 5-9 pm donated to the farm.

Mrs. Benner announced that the Garden Club will hold the plant sale virtually again this year with online orders starting May 1. Curbside contactless pickup will be on River Bay Road May 13, 14 and 15. Yard of the Month judging has begun and signs placed in the yards of the winners for April for the 5 sectors of the neighborhood.

Philippe Ourisson reported the Cape Conservation Corps (CCC) is active with the Weed Warrior volunteers at the Serene Ravine. The Clean Streams program will be Apr 24, with a maximum of 25 people at each of three sites. All slots for swapping invasive plants for native species are filled. He inquired what to do about motorized vehicles on the path from the Lake Claire parking lot to the lake. The board recommended contacting the office so that we can check camera footage and work with the police.

ADJOURNMENT

A motion was made to move to a closed session and approved unanimously. A closed session was convened at 8:34 pm and adjourned at 9:12 pm. The regular session of the April 12, 2021 Board of Governors meeting was adjourned at 9:12 pm.

HISTORIC GOSHEN FARM AND EDUCATIONAL CENTER

History Continued...

Where Dr. Radoff was the son of immigrants, many of May's ancestors had been in America since the 17th century, some serving in the American revolution. A cousin had purchased Whitehall and spent much of his life renovating it. It remains in the family today.

Despite his role as an academic, Dr, Radoff also worked the farm. There was livestock and gardens to be maintained. Interviewed in the 1970's he had many tales to tell about the local characters and events. The interview is available in a publication called "Broadneck, Maryland's Historic Peninsula".

During their ownership of the house, several additions were built, including a piano room for May and a bathroom. "Leon's little house" where he spent a fair amount of time, still exists on the property. Unfortunately, the barn was struck by lightning and burned down, and some other structures were removed due to age and disuse.

Dr. and Mrs. Radoff turned down an offer to sell their property to the Riverbay Land Company for incorporation into Cape St. Claire, in fact they purchased about 10 acres from them in 1950.

By the mid 1960's the Board of Education had an interest in the land for the construction of an elementary and middle school. Under threat of eminent domain, Dr. Radoff sold 30 acres to the Board on Jan. 26, 1967. Cape St. Claire elementary school was built a short time later.

In September 1975 Dr. Radoff made a life estate agreement with the Board of Education, allowing May to remain in the home for the remainder of her life.

Dr. Radoff died on Dec. 2, 1978 and was buried at the Annapolis Hebrew cemetery. May passed away on August 26, 1991 and was buried at the farm of a close friend in St. Margarets.

At the time of May Radoff's death, approximately 22 acres of the property remained undeveloped.

Our Club is always seeking ways to reduce waste, and we appreciate your donations – at 1121 River Bay Rd, any time – of your used solo cups, plant pots, trays, and cast-off venetian blinds for making into plant tags.

Your generous support of our sale each year enables the club to host a series of educational speakers and hands-on workshops, provide scholarships to Members who pursue further study, maintain our beautiful neighborhood beds, and donate plants and expertise to local scout and school groups for their own beautification or ecological projects. Thank you for your kind support year after year!

And as temperatures warm, remember to clear standing water from your yards, and help your elderly neighbors to do the same. Mosquitoes need standing water for 4-6 days for their eggs to develop into larvae and then into the biting adults. Let's work together to keep Cape livable all summer long!

In mid-April, our Members gathered for our annual Dividing Perennials Workshop. Outdoors and socially distanced, our meetings are still enjoyable, convivial events – how wonderful to get out and safely see old friends and make new ones. Several members brought clumps of plants from their yards, such as hostas, phlox, black eyed susans, & carex. We used various tools such as drywall saws, bread knives, soil knives, and our bare hands, and learned best practices to divide the plants into viable divisions and



re-pot them. The potted divisions will spend a month growing full in their pots, before being offered at our sale. Did you know that you can also divide your own plants if you want to have *free* plants of your own? Dividing plants is good for your garden anyhow, to keep plants' roots from becoming tangled and overcrowded – it's a win-win! Our Members will continue to pot plants at various Cape locations throughout April to bring the widest variety of healthy and unique plants to our online Plant Sale.



Understory Trees for your Home Landscape By: Stacey Wildberger

There are many plant layers to successful ecosystems-from the groundcover, herbaceous plants, shrubs, understory up to the tall canopy layer. Each level plays a vital role in the health of the ecosystem and biodiversity in the landscape, but the understory is an often overlooked layer in our home landscapes. We often plant lush garden filled with flowering plants, a few ground covers plants, some shrubs and of course we all know Cape has plenty of canopy trees shading us!

Amelanchier Canadensis Eastern serviceberry —this wonderful tree will provide 3 seasons of interest starting in early spring with beautiful berries that feed robins, catbirds, chickadees and cardinals. Serviceberries fall color is spectacular. It is also of high value to many of our native bees. This moisture loving trade can be planted in sun to shade conditions.

Cercis Canadensis Eastern Redbud –nothing says spring like the glorious purple blooms of the Redbud, they can be seen blooming along the roadways, parks and neighborhood streets. These early blooming trees offer an early source of nectar for foraging insects and bees. The leaves, seeds and blooms are utilized from songbirds, pollinators and mammals. It can tolerate part shade to shade so it makes an ideal specimen for many Cape yards.

Chionanthus virginicus White Fringe tree –this 15-30' tree is known for its drooping clusters of fragrant, white blooms. One of the last trees to leaf out in the spring, it often appears dead until the leaves and flowers appear. The flowers are pure white, wispy and cloudlike. The blue plum-like berries are attractive to birds and mammals and the flowers are attractive to many pollinators.

Asimina triloba Pawpaw —this multi-stemmed shrub grows 10-40' high. It has large tropical like leaves that turn a beautiful yellow-green in the fall. The small banana tasting fruit makes a delicious jam if you can harvest it before the opossums, squirrels, raccoons and birds eat them! The Pawpaw is also the only host plant for zebra swallowtail butterfly.

Juniperus virginiana Eastern Red Cedar — the most widely distributed eastern conifer-across 37 states it is extremely resistant to drought, heat and cold and grows to 30 to 40′. This beautiful tree offers many benefits for wildlife from the berries that are a staple to many birds and mammals including the cedar waxwing named for this tree to offering nesting material and cover. It does well in dry areas from sun to shade.

Habitat Hero 2021 2nd Quarter Winner

Emily Brown is the 2nd Quarter 2021 winner of Cape Conservation Corps Habitat Hero Award. One of the best ways to attract local fauna to your yard and create a welcoming habitat is to plant more natives, then add some natives! That is exactly what Emily's plan is. Eventually she would like her entire garden to be only natives. Emily recently participated in CCC's native plant swap. She agreed to dig up a non-native invasive shrub in her yard *Nandina domestica* heavenly bamboo and CCC replaced them with three natives shrubs (she selected 1 of each Spicebush, American Beautyberry and Sweet spire) and is also planning on adding Winterberry this year.

She has already planted seeds of milkweed in a bed with *Echinacea* coneflowers. *Rudbeckia* Black eyed Susan's and a native hydrangea round out the natives thriving in her garden. Every year she leave the leaves to create habitat for overwintering insects and a food source for birds and small mammals. Rain barrels on each gutter of the house help to catch rain water and slow it down to prevent runoff. They use the water from the rain barrels to water my plants inside and in the garden the house, wash their hands when they are outside playing or done with outside activities By adding natives, food sources, nesting areas and having a pesticide free yard Emily has created a beautiful and safe place for the local fauna!
