Dear Capers,

I hope you had a wonderful holiday with your family and friends and have had a good start to the New Year! The CSCIA Board of Governors (BOG) has had a very busy beginning to 2023 to say the least!

First and foremost, I want to thank everyone for coming to the annual meeting, which was held on January 10th. We had a good turnout and reached a quorum before our usual start time. The meeting resulted in electing six residents to Board of Governor positions with various terms bringing the BOG to full strength at 12 members for the first time since 2013. I want to thank everyone who ran, whether an incumbent, choosing to rejoin the Board with past experience or the two members who have lived in Cape just over 6 months and wanted to get active right off the bat! So, a big thanks to Merissa Pimenta who will serve a one-year term, Jennifer Connor, who will serve a two-year term and Cheri Fairchild, Matt Layman, Neil Macindoe, and Kim Pollock who will serve full three-year terms, ending in January 2026! The Board then elected its new Executive Members: Mary Lamb as Vice-President, Jerome Zadera as Treasurer, and Kim Pollock as Secretary, and lastly myself, to begin my 7th term as President, in my 11th year as a member of the Board of Governors.

We also held elections for Budget Committee and both Charlie Shoul and Adam "Thor" Harris were elected. Charlie will serve a two-year term and they join Charlie Moore, who has served for 6 years now and was elected to a two-year term in 2022.

Also, the voting membership passed the Fiscal Year 2024 Budget and the \$10.00 Special Community Benefit District (SCBD) fee increase. This brings each SCBD Tax Account Fee up to \$210.00 starting in FY 24, or after July 1st, 2023. Those funds will go towards helping offset the rising cost of inflation on minimum wage increases, contractors, electric, legal, and long-term maintenance of our properties among other categories.

The biggest news to start the year, though, is the CSCIA Board of Governors would like to announce that we have found our new Town Manager! We hired Aerotek to conduct a search for our new Town Manager. Over about 4-5 weeks to end 2022, they accepted applications, conducted screening and interviews, and made recommendations of qualified candidates to the BOG. The Board of Governors interview team made up of Joe Angel, Mary Lamb, Neil Macindoe, Kim Pollock, and Jerome Zadera, conducted interviews and made a recommendation on a

We extended an offer, and it was accepted by our prime candidate that night verbally and in writing the following day. At that time, we introduced the CSCIA new Town Manager, Frank Tewey, at the CSCIA Annual Meeting. Frank comes to us with wealth knowledge and connections in Anne Arundel County, has extensive leadership qualifications and experience managing both large and small employee groups and involvement in community service and volunteerism. We are excited that Frank will start as Town Manager on January 23rd, 2023. I will let Frank introduce himself in his Town Manager Report, a few pages back in this

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Board In Brief CSCIA Board Of Governors Monthly Meeting JANUARY 9, 2023

In attendance in person: Pres. Beau Breeden, Govs. Neil Macindoe, Mary Lamb, Kim Pollack, Jerome Zadera, Joe Angel and Ed Hayes, guests Stacey Wildberger, Steve Arnold, and Thor Harris. In attendance online: Gov. Michele Shipley.

Pres. Breeden called the meeting to order at 7:33 pm. He wished everyone a happy new year, announced the annual meeting and reported that the yellow maintenance fee postcards were mailed. Payment is due March 1, 2023 and parking stickers will not be sent out to anyone with outstanding maintenance fees.

MINUTES AND FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Minutes of the Dec 12, 2022 BOG meeting were reviewed and approved unanimously.

Financial statements for Nov 30, 2022 were reviewed. A motion to accept was made. Pres. Breeden noted that we are 5 months into the fiscal year. Piers income is received mostly in Feb, so it is normal to look under budget now and reserves are sufficient for normal pier operations. Caper advertising, clubhouse rentals and HOA packets are ahead of predicted income. Maintenance expenses are high due to removal of several trees. A 2nd SCBD check was received in Dec. The motion passed unanimously.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Note-With the annual meeting occurring on Jan 10, committee reports were postponed until then with the following exceptions:

Grants: Pres. Breeden reported grant committee members and representatives from Alliance of the Chesapeake participated in the phone conference regarding grant applications to be submitted to US Fish and Wildlife, the county, etc. Alliance wants to nominate the

Cape beach project for an AA County BUBBA award (Best Urban Best Management Practices in the Bay Area). US Fish & Wildlife will accept grant applications Feb-Apr for projects in the Chesapeake Bay Watershed, for both the planning/design phase and for construction. Pres. Breeden was pleased that the committee includes residents with skills and experience in fields that should allow for better grant applications and more community involvement. Anyone interested in participating in the committee should contact the board. A response to the application is not expected until the fall. Funds remaining from the Sites 1 & 2 projects are available for preliminary work. Alliance will get more details and contracts will be reviewed by the attorney. Stacy Wildberger noted that a letter of support from the county stating that our projects can be an example for other communities would help the application to stand out.

Piers: Pres. Breeden reported the contractor for the county dredge of Deep Creek, Crandell Marine Construction, is awaiting final approval. Surveyor pontoon boats should be arriving soon. CSCIA was included in the permit for spur dredging and the plan for aquatic vegetation mitigation was approved. The first ever dredge of Deep Creek will remove sediment down to a foot below mean low tide. Due to the size of equipment being used, not all areas CSCIA would like dredged will be accessible. As the expense would not fall within the general operating budget but in the self-funded piers budget, the board can approve it. A motion was made to approve \$75,000 for the dredge. Discussion followed regarding areas to be dredged, the timeline to replace the small Deep Creek pier and dredging in conjunction with that. By being included in the county dredge now, we

would not have to get additional permits or pay for disposal of the dredge material, which is poor quality and not available for use elsewhere. The motion passed unanimously.

Pres. Breeden also said board members had received letters from a slip owner who had received a letter of non-renewal due to non-use of their boat. Discussion followed regarding enforcement of rules, communication, reasonable expectations, reporting of use, terms of probation, misunderstanding of ownership, documentation, etc. It was decided that the board would defer to the piers committee and allow them to decide whether to allow the boat owner to continue to lease a slip.

Security: Twelve of 31 shifts in Jan. are covered by police.

OLD BUSINESS

Pres. Breeden reported that AeroTek conducted the search for a town manager. One qualified candidate was interviewed on Jan. 7.

Further discussion will be held in closed session.

NEW BUSINESS

No new business.

COMMENTS

Resident Steve Arnold reported that the main beach continues to erode behind his property and toward the inlet. He thanked those who helped move rocks and cinder blocks from his collapsed wall and would like more help moving what has collapsed in the storms since the first cleanup. He had a survey of his property completed. His wall is on Cape property at one end and his property extends out onto the beach on the other. Pres. Breeden added that with the beach project and litigation regarding the unapproved pier construction at another beachfront home in the past, the original plats were verified, and riparian rights confirmed. He added that CCSIA and owners of beachfront property work together to reach resolutions. Pres. Breeden said the final sand retention measurements were done in Dec., and the report will be made available on the website as soon as possible.

Stacey Wildberger announced the Cape Conservation Corps (CCC) removed English ivy at Little Magothy Beach and will plant cedar trees there and other locations. Bill Lynch, a teacher in Baltimore, will have students build Leopold benches for installation. CCC is planning a project to spark interest in big trees. It will feature stories of favorite trees, the importance of trees, etc.

Resident Matt Layman said he hopes to serve on the board again.

Resident Thor Harris said he would like to serve on the grants committee and hopes to be elected to the budget committee.

ADJOURNMENT

A motion was made to adjourn to closed session and approved unanimously. The meeting was adjourned to closed session at 8:39 pm.

The Jan. 9, 2023 CSCIA Board of Governors meeting was adjourned at 9:16 pm.



Volunteer Spotlight - Eloise Ullman

Eloise moved to Winchester on the Severn in 1994 and from Montgomery County has lived there ever since. She attends Broadneck Baptist Church, on the corner of Hilltop & Cape St. Claire Road. In the spring of 2021, the church reached out to Goshen Farm to assess the possibility of holding its annual summer Music & Arts Camp at Goshen Farm. They weren't yet comfortable having a large group of children meeting inside their building due to COVID and were trying to come up with some alternative formats. Goshen's board welcomed us and did everything it could to facilitate our new venture. The church loved the experience (as did the kids) of learning and playing outside. They included aspects of the Farm's history in the curriculum, and several experts taught the children about the mission of the Farm today. They also held some worship services at the Farm which allowed them to finally meet in person, rather than on Zoom, as they had been for 2+ years. The church was so grateful to the Goshen Farm board of directors for creating this partnership with our church. Currently, they work into their worship schedule some Sunday mornings at Goshen Farm and other activities throughout the year. For all of the reasons above Eloise feels very strongly that if you wish a place or organization or any other entity to survive, it's important that you "walk the walk." Although she is 73 years old, there are activities she can do to help and assist with Goshen's programs. Eloise is a Master Watershed Steward (Severn River) and is also inspired by Goshen Farm's commitment to environmental education. Since the church is one of several on the Broadneck Peninsula that supports My Brothers Pantry, she appreciates

Goshen Farm's partnership with the Pantry to supply their clients with fresh farm goods during the growing season. Finally, she just gets really good vibes being at Goshen Farm; there is a sense of welcome, stewardship of the property, respect for the memories of the people who lived on the land, love of nurturing plants, animals, and people, and great creativity.

Whether sunny and brisk, icy, or just plain bleak, these are the days for some to imagine, dream, learn, and plan. Meetings spark new ideas and provide materials for some beneficial projects. While walking around Cape, one can already see winter jasmine, winter honeysuckle, lenten

roses, snow drops, and witch hazels blooming away, and some of these are even fragrant! Those of us who really thought ahead might have potted crocus, daffodils, and hyacinths blooming indoors, induced by warmer


temperatures to bloom early.

Winter is a lovely time for gardeners to repair, sharpen, maintain, or build things needed in


the garden. Stone walls, newly mulched paths, a new garden bench, perhaps? In keeping with this, Garden Club Members and Guests at our January meeting created mason bee houses using

upcycled tin cans & hollow stems from the garden such as milkweed, bamboo, rushes,











or phragmites, with a piece of twine added for hanging in a tree or porch. These hollow sticks provide important habitat for insects to lay their eggs and grow their young. Each participant received a packet of information about mason bees, including recommended placement of the bee houses. Members also took home seeds for them to Winter Sow outside using translucent boxes, continuing a long-standing tradition in our Club. What heralds spring like fresh sprouts of green *outdoors* in late February?

In response to member interest regarding *Vegetable Gardening*, Cory Stephens of Anne Arundel County Lawn & Garden will be sharing his expertise at our next meeting on **Tuesday, February 7**th. Cape Champion/Story Tree: Latrobe Drive and St John Rd

Sometimes a great story tree is also a champion. This 3 foot diameter 70+ foot tall Dawn Redwood is one of a kind In the Cape and probably on the Broadneck peninsula. Longtime Cape resident Marie Dunmeyer planted this tree in her yard 50 years ago. She purchased the seedling when it was only a few feet tall at Evergreen Nursery for \$30 in 1972. It was the most expensive plant she ever bought. Marie bought the tree because she had become intrigued by the story of the rediscovery of the dawn redwood in China. Long thought to be extinct, the Dawn Redwood (Metasequoia glyptostroboides) was rediscovered deep in a valley in central China in the 1940s. The Arnold Arboretum of Harvard University then distributed seeds across the world, playing a big role in the tree's international conservation. A living fossil, this tree was found in North America

until the last ice age! The Dawn Redwood is in the sequoia family and one of only 3 species of redwood in the world. It is a deciduous conifer, which means it is one of a few species of conifer (think pine cones) that sheds its needles in the winter

Marie is very proud of her tree and how it has grown and thinks that it is a magnificent tree.

WINTER TIP:

Show Cape Trees a little love: Removing Ivy

(Hedera helix), was long used as a groundcover and was valued for its appearance and ability to cover large areas. However, it was quickly apparent that ivy did not stay where it was intended. It is now considered highly invasive. This time of year, it is easy to spot trees that are infested with English ivy. When an ivy stem reaches a tree's trunk, it attaches itself to the tree's bark and heads upwards into the tree's crown. This is where the problems start. Ivy uses root hairs to attach to the bark and excretes a kind of "glue" to bond to the surface it's climbing. If you've ever tried to pull ivy off a fence you know how strong that "glue" is! Once secure they grow upward and outward in search of sunlight. However, once ivy begins climbing up a tree it grows quickly and isn't likely to stop.

- As ivy smothers a tree's trunk, it siphons resources (water and nutrients) to support its own growth, taking those resources away from your trees.
- A thick coating of ivy harbors fungal spores and other pests.
- Ivy uses your tree as a scaffold to climb, its weight creates unbalanced branches that are more likely to break, especially during storms.
- In the crown of a tree, ivy can overtake the tree's own foliage, blocking the sunlight that foliage needs to photosynthesize and make energy stores.
- When English Ivy reaches full sunlight, it's leaves may change shape and
 it begins producing seeds that birds can spread far from the source. Over
 time, all of these weaken a tree, reduce its lifespan and its benefits to the
 local ecology. The most effective way to control English ivy is to manually
 remove it.
- First sever the ivy stems on your tree's trunk with clippers and remove ivy that's growing in the ground around your trees.
- The most effective way to get rid of ground ivy is to pull out its roots. It can be tough going so try watering the area beforehand to soften the soil (or wait until after a rainfall). Let's show some love to our trees and get rid of English ivy!





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The ABC's of Primary Care!

With the holidays feeling long gone, and as resolutions fade to the background of our lives, we turn the calendar to February, and a focus on all things hearts and love! February is "Heart Month", and one of the best ways to care for your heart is to have a good working relationship with your Primary Care Practitioner (PCP). Primnary Care is one area of wellness that doesn't get much fanfare yet is incredibly important! According to the Center for Disease Control's (CDC) website 88.1% of Americans had a doctor visit in 2021; however only 76.2% took advantage of a wellness visit (https://wwwn.cdc.gov/NHISDataQueryTool/SHS_adult/index.html). Although these percentages are surprisingly high, wellness visit percentages are trending down! Even a decrease in 2-3% has a significant impact on the health of the nation! And if maintaining health and wellness is not enough of a reason to establish a relationship with a PCP, saving money might be. Studies show that individuals who see a PCP regularly have less trips to the Emergency Room and less admissions to hospitals (Harvard Health Publishing, www.health.harvard.edu). One thing to

remember is that health care takes time, and we often feel like we do not have enough time. However, it is important to establish a relationship with a PCP, oftentimes beginning with an annual wellness check, because issues may not be relieved or even uncovered in one visit. Sara Headley, a Family Nurse Practitioner at a community health center stressed the importance of multiple visits because patients often arrive "in distress" and cannot participate in care under the emotional strain. Additionally, she stressed that figuring out medical needs takes time, and one visit may not be enough to get a full picture of a patient's needs. Ms. Headley stressed the importance of beginning a health relationship with well visits, if possible, but if that is not possible then follow up care and care across the weeks, months, and years is incredibly important for a practitioner to fully understand what is going on with a patient. Like any good relationship, communication, openness, and time spent are incredibly important. Your heart and health will thank you for the investment you make with your PCP!

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


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
