Board In Brief CSCIA Board Of Governors Monthly Meeting FEBRUARY 12, 2024

In attendance in person: Pres. Jerome Zadera, Govs. Joe Angel, Beau Breeden, Cheri Fairchild, Thor Harris, Ed Hayes, Mary Lamb, Matt Layman, Neil Macindoe, Kim Pollock, and Michele Shipley, Town Manager Frank Tewey, Budget Committee member Blake Morris and guests Steve Arnold, Charlie & Jessica Corliss, Cathy Gazzo, Sara & Dan Guay, Rob Hamilton, Phil Runk, and Stacey Wildberger.

Pres. Zadera called the meeting to order at 7:30 pm, thanked everyone for helping during his transition to president and reported that maintenance fees are due by Mar 1, \$10 per tax lot.

RECOGNIZED ORG REQUEST

Representatives from Cape Vibes requested to become a Cape Recognized Organization. The group consists of 97% Cape residents, of all ages and musical abilities gathering to play music. They perform at the beaches regularly. Membership and performances are free, and any donations go directly to local non-profits. Their strict code of conduct includes the CSCIA beach rules. They work with beach attendants and take responsibility for their guests. They would like to become a recognized org for meetings at the clubhouse in inclement weather, inclusion in the Cape Calendar, parking for events, and use of the beach. A resident offered support, noting it is a free resource to learn to create music, just as local parks allow for sports. Cape Conservation Corps offered support as a recipient of their donations. The decision would be made by the board in closed session.

MINUTES AND FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Minutes of the Jan 8, 2024 BOG meeting were reviewed, a motion made to approve the minutes and approved unanimously.

The financial statements for Dec 2023 were reviewed and a motion made to approve. Gov. Breeden noted they represent 6 months of the fiscal year. Balances of the CSCIA bank accounts are about \$169K for the operating funds, \$203K in beach grant funds, \$231,700 in piers funds, and the Special Community Benefits District (SCBD) operating funds of about \$320,600. The motion passed unanimously.

TOWN MANAGER REPORT

- Town Manager Tewey said that maintenance fee payments are due Mar 1.
- The Google Workspace subscription was changed from monthly to annual for cost savings.
- Our one remaining security officer is covering 12 of 29 shifts in Feb. Mr. Tewey recommends raising the rate for officers to be more competitive. He continues to explore options for wireless camera service improvements.
- · In the spring, a memorial bench will be installed, and portable restrooms will be delivered.
- Mr. Tewey is researching automated gates for the main beach and will be hiring beach attendants soon.
- Several fallen trees were addressed by Richards Tree Care.
- Administrative hearings with the county are scheduled for two properties. One standard building request was approved, and one is pending. The county is requiring a Vegetation Management Plan (VMP) for a previously CSCIA approved variance and the homeowners proposed using abutting Cape property for part of the plantings, but their plan did not meet CSCIA requests. One pier agreement was recorded in AA County land records, and one is still in process. A request for stairs from a bulkhead was denied.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Broadneck Council of Communities (BCC): Gov. Breeden was elected president of the BCC after Pat Lynch stepped down. They are looking for volunteers to help support the Broadneck peninsula. Meetings are the 4th Thursday of each month. They expect follow-up reports on the highway studies, the Chesapeake Nat'l Recreation Area, and the zoning change recommendations by the Planning Advisory Board. He recommends everyone get involved by learning zoning recommendations and voicing opinions either online or at public meetings.

Spring is on its way! Daylight saving time begins Sunday, March 10th, so remember to move your clocks up one hour!

If you've paid your 2024 Maintenance Fees and provided us with your vehicle information, your parking passes will be mailed out in April. If you've not paid your fees please do so! Any payment received after March 1st does incur a late fee in the amount of \$10 that must also be paid.

Dottie, Matt and Parker, our wonderful maintenance staff, will be out and about preparing our facilities for spring's arrival. If you see them, please thank them for all they do!

Portable restrooms will be placed at Main Beach, Lake Claire and Deep Creek during the month of March.

Piers contracts are due back by March 15th! Please ensure you have all required documentation (i.e. current boat registration) before turning your contracts in. Any contract that needs to be returned will incur a \$50 service fee. Remember, your Maintenance Fees must be paid before turning in your contract! Vessels are required to be in their assigned slips by June 1st!

Last year we had a great crew of Beach Attendants and many will be returning again this year. However, a limited number of positions may be available for new Beach Attendants. Applicants must be 14 years of age or older and be available throughout the summer including weekends and holidays. Primary duties include: greeting residents, verifying entry eligibility, monitoring usage of CSCIA properties, making notifications by phone as required/needed. 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Board In Brief CONTINUED

Beaches & Parks: Gov. Macindoe thanked Gov. Hayes for stepping in to close beach gates in his absence.

Caper: Gov. Lamb received many positive reactions to the Feb Year in Review photo issue.

Clubhouse: Gov. Lamb reported steady rentals. A deep cleaning is scheduled, and a contract made with a new cleaning company.

Events: Gov. Lamb said the Easter Egg Hunt is Mar 23. Tickets are available at Whimsicality with delivery of 12 plastic eggs and candy.

Grants: Gov. Breeden will attend a meeting with Alliance for the Chesapeake Bay regarding 2023 US Fish & Wildlife grants that were tabled during federal budget issues, and the availability of grants in 2024. If awarded, the 2023 grants would go towards design of beach restoration at all sites. BioHabitats is under contract for assistance with the potential receiving of sand from the planned dredge of the Little Magothy River. The Little Magothy River Association (LMRA) received a Waterway Improvement grant for that dredge.

Piers: Gov. Breeden reported that contract offers were sent to slip holders and are due Mar 16. Annual maintenance fees must be paid before contracts are accepted, then the slip assignments process will begin. Open slips will be offered to those on the waitlist in Apr/May.

Strawberry Festival: Governor Lamb reported she is working on the special events permit process for the Festival and the July 4 events.

OLD BUSINESS

Gov. Breeden spoke about environmental mitigation issues to be addressed by the county before construction can begin on the new firehouse. The storm water management system created when Cape St Claire Rd was widened will be removed to make space for the new firehouse. They need 6 acres to plant trees and shrubs. The largest open tracts in the area are owned by county schools and by CSCIA, both of whom may need that space for future mitigation projects of their own.

Gov. Macindoe noted that the Lake Claire boat pier gate and access for the landscaper both need to be addressed.

NEW BUSINESS

Pres. Zadera reported that the board will vote for the officers and budget for the 5 CSCIA owned lots in the LMRA.

COMMENTS

A resident asked about getting a large gas grill installed at Lake Claire. Govs. Breeden and Macindoe said that given harsh conditions, liability, the need to secure it, critical area permits, open space issues, maintenance, and vandalism, it is not practical.

Stacy Wildberger said the Cape Conservation Corps (CCC) had a successful ivy removal day with Save Our Trees. A scholarship for Broadneck High School seniors entering environmental science majors was established and applications are due Apr 1. A Girl Scout will present a plan soon for a little library at Little Magothy Beach. It will include items for use at the beach such as bird/plant identification books, sketch books, journals, environmental education, etc. A resident has given CCC several boxes of books.

ADJOURNMENT

A motion was made to adjourn to closed session and approved unanimously. The meeting was adjourned to closed session at 8:29 pm. The closed session occurred from 8:36 pm to 9:56 pm. The Feb 12, 2024 CSCIA Board of Governors meeting was adjourned at 9:56 pm.

Colds, RSV, Influenza, Oh My!

Cold and flu season is typically the fall and winter months but the prevalence of colds and flu can span from September to May! That leaves only three official off season months yet we all know the "summer cold" is real! What are these nasty bugs and what can we do to minimize their effects on our family,

work/school schedule, and health in general? Oh, and what in the world is RSV? Great questions!

Let's start by outlining the similarities and differences between these three illnesses, all caused by viruses and effect the respiratory system (Think breathing! And that is pretty important!). According to Johns Hopkins Medicine, the "common cold" can be caused by as many as 200 different viruses; however, the rhinovirus is the most common culprit. The rhinovirus is spread through airborne droplets when someone infected coughs or sneezes into the air. These droplets can linger in the air to be breathed in by another person and settle on surfaces where they can remain infectious (make you sick) for hours to days depending on the surface! And because the cold is caused by a virus there is no treatment; the cold must "run its course" and only the symptoms can be treated and minimized with medication. Additionally, there is no vaccine for rhinovirus because it mutates (changes the DNA/genetic code) very quickly and comes in many forms. Doctors are unable to make a vaccine to defend against a cold like they can for flu.

Influenza, or the "flu", is also caused by a virus. Flu virus is also spread when an infected person coughs or sneezes into the air and another person breathes in the tiny airborne droplets or touches a surface contaminated with live virus and then touches their mouth, nose or eyes. The virus can live on hard surfaces for up to 48 hours and soft surfaces for up to 4 days. That means all the items mentioned in last months "Cape Nurse" article about where germs hide are the culprits! (Side Note: a friend reminded me that gas pumps are a hot bed for germs but did not come up on my lists while researching. But she's right: gas pumps are terribly germy! Thanks Kari!). However, it is common knowledge that we have an annual flu vaccine. The World Health Organization (WHO) along with the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) track worldwide flu trends (which strain of flu virus is most prevalent worldwide) to formulate the annual vaccine so it is effective each year. While the flu vaccine is not a 100% guarantee that one will not contract the flu, if you get your vaccine



it is likely the severity will be significantly lessened. It is recommended that every person above 6 months of age should get the annual flu vaccine unless a person has an allergy to an ingredient in the vaccine. If a person is infected with the influenza virus, we say "they got the flu"! Treating the symptoms are important but there are also medications that can shorten the course of the flu. These medications are prescribed by a doctor (as in you need a prescription!). These medications attack the virus and stop it from multiplying in your body thereby shortening the duration of illness and lessening the symptoms.

Finally RSV: Respiratory syncytial virus! This virus spreads the same way as cold and flu; droplets from an infected person are released into the air by a cough or sneeze and breathed in or touched on a surface that the droplets have settled on. RSV symptoms are similar to cold and flu symptoms and typically "run its course" without major issue. Treating the symptoms are important for comfort. However, RSV is a virus that often causes bronchiolitis in babies and complications in older adults. Bronchiolitis is a swelling of the tiny airways in the lungs and complications of severe bronchiolitis include low oxygen levels in the body. Air cannot fill the lungs due to the inflammation, the body must work harder to breathe. and eating and drinking are effected. While other respiratory viruses can cause bronchiolitis, it is more common with RSV. It is recommended that pregnant women get the RSV vaccine to protect their baby until the age of 6 months, and adults over 60 years of age. As we age our immune systems weakens thus limiting our ability to fight infection. Additionally, RSV can complicate conditions such as asthma, COPD, and congestive heart failure leading to hospitalization.

What can I do to protect my family and community from these viruses? The best way to protect yourself, your family, and community is to know how to stop the spread of germs! Cover coughs and sneezes in the bend of your elbow, disinfect surfaces regularly, and WASH YOUR HANDS frequently. Stay home if you are sick and wear a mask (properly covering your mouth AND nose, and throw the mask away after use) if you must go out. Also, read the "Cape Nurse" article monthly for more in depth reminders!



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
