## **President's Perspective**

Capers,

As we embrace the beauty of fall, marked by colorful leaves and crisp air, our community also prepares for new opportunities. The transition into the school year brings a renewed energy and a chance to reflect on our goals and aspirations.

We've managed to plan for some exciting projects, one of which is our continual work on the beach replenishment project. We've hired Biohabitats, as well as partnered with the Little Magothy River Association, to provide site analysis, design, permitting, and construction observations for our beneficial reuse of 7,000 cubic yards of dredge material. We're also able to utilize our grant funding which continues to help support the 1,625 linear feet of shoreline restoration and enhancement and 900 linear feet of stream restoration.

The proposed improvements are anticipated to consist of a marsh area at the mouth of Lake Claire, which is considered site #2. Beach nourishment, site #1, will be along Main Beach using locally deposited dredge material from the Little Magothy River. Prior improvements at Sites 1 and 2 include stone breakwaters, groins, oyster balls and other estuarine habitat enhancement features, and native site plantings to improve fish and other aquatic and avian species habitat.

In addition to the proposed features at Sites 1 and 2, Biohabitats recognizes that the County's repair of the storm drain near 1226 River Bay Road leaves a significant gap between the culvert outfall at the new bulkhead and receiving Magothy River. Biohabitats have attempted to have the County extend this to the waterward limit of the adjacent new groin, but this did not occur. In order to provide an outfall condition more functionally and aesthetically compatible with the proposed Site 1 design, Biohabitats proposal includes engineering and design to extend the storm drain to the waterward extent of the groin as well as modifying the groin to bury the storm drain extension so it will be resilient to Nor'easter storms.

Although this effort should be funded by the County, it is unclear if and when this work may occur.

Biohabitats anticipates that permitting agencies, including the United States Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) and Maryland Department of the Environment (MDE), will require post construction monitoring as a permit condition to authorize proposed work. Since specific monitoring requirements and duration are unclear, Biohabitats will provide a separate scope to perform post-construction monitoring as requested by CSCIA.

As we transition from summer to fall, let's carry the spirit of community and connection into the coming months. Together, we can ensure that our shared experiences—from the fun of summer to the excitement of new beginnings—shape a bright future for all.

Here's to a season of change, growth, and continued community spirit!

## **Board In Brief** CSCIA Board Of Governors Monthly Meeting SEPTEMBER 9, 2024

In attendance in person: Pres. Zadera, Govs. Beau Breeden, Cheri Fairchild, Thor Harris, Ed Hayes, Mary Lamb, Matt Layman, Neil Macindoe, Kim Pollock, Town Manager Frank Tewey, Budget Comm. members Charlie Moore, Blake Morris and Charlie Shoul and guests Becky Benner, Paul and Alexa Bryan, and Stacy Wildberger.

Pres. Zadera called the meeting to order at 7:33 pm and noted that school is back in session after a great summer. He remembered the 9-11 tragedy and spoke about how people came together as a community and a country. He asked that everyone promote kindness and have Cape St Claire set an example of community cooperation.

### **VARIANCE HEARING**

Town Manager Tewey introduced a variance request for an open-sided carport to be built attached to the house extending into the side setback and past the front of the house even with the porch. They have not yet applied to the county. The house takes up most of the 60-foot-wide lot. The neighbor provided a letter stating no objection. Mr. Tewey will contact the owners with the closed session decision.

### MINUTES AND FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Minutes of the Aug. 12, 2024, BOG meeting were reviewed and approved unanimously.

The financial statements for July 2024 were discussed. A motion was made to approve. Balances of the bank accounts were: Operating funds- \$172,000 Beach restoration grants- \$192,000, piers- \$301,000, and Special Community Benefits District (SCBD)- \$241,000. The motion passed unanimously.

### **TOWN MANAGER REPORT**

Mr. Tewey reported on the following: Work on the new crosswalk has not started. The budget committee will meet Sep. 19 to finalize a balanced budget to present to the board in Oct. The audit report for FY24 is expected before the Sep. 28 deadline.

Police officers are covering 16 of 30 dates in Sep. Crime reports are being supplied monthly from county police.

The board approved installation of a chain link fence along the clubhouse field. A letter will be sent to the owners of adjacent homes. The last boat slip census was completed Sep. 9. Gov. Macindoe will follow up with Youth Sailing regarding changes to kayak rack rentals.

Five building requests were received. The county administrative board approved a variance to allow a deck with less setback and buffer than required. The county bill to outlaw gas-powered leaf blowers is to be withdrawn by the sponsor. A hearing is scheduled for overnight RV usage on highways on Oct. 7.

Beach attendants worked 11am-7pm from Memorial Day - Labor Day with only two missed shifts. Tallies kept during each shift reported 21,401 people coming to the beaches, 745 trailers to the boat ramp and 355 non-residents denied access. There was one incident of note with confusion about a B&B renter. Gov. Macindoe added that many cars paused by the gates, saw an attendant, and left.

The county will be relining sewer pipes along River Bay Rd and Hampton Dr and requested permission to park equipment at the end of the field for about 4 months. They will pay rent and restore any damage. Sponsors of any events that may be impacted will be notified.

### **COMMITTEE REPORTS**

Broadneck Council of Communities (BCC): Gov. Breeden reported the next BCC meeting on Sep. 26. County Councilwoman Feidler will give an update on the General Development Plan. The State Highway Admin. will share findings of the Route 50 traffic study. Candidates for circuit court judge and board of education will introduce themselves. Dept of Natural Resources paperwork is in process for acquiring Holly Beach Farm. The BCC has requested to be part of the advisory board. Many would like the farm to become an educational park.

Caper: Gov. Lamb said the Sep. issue came out early. Please submit articles asap.

Clubhouse: Gov. Lamb reported rentals remain steady.

Events: Gov. Lamb announced the next event is Halloween Happenings and another movie night is possible.

**Legislative:** Gov. Breeden noted that the Chesapeake National Recreation Area bill was read in both the House and Senate, but with no movement since, if it does not make it through in Jan., this bill will be dead, and a new one will be needed to try again.

**Piers:** Gov. Breeden announced a piers budget was approved including 5% increases for slips without 30-amp service and 10% for those with 30-amp service. Estimates are coming in for replacement of the small pier at Deep Creek, the decking around the boat ramp, and a section of the bulkhead. The latest is \$248K. Meetings are being held with contractors. Pier maintenance is financed through slip rentals.

They've done amazing work there. Next time you're near the clubhouse, please notice all the work the Garden Club has done to keep us green and beautiful. Thanks to both organizations for all their hard work!

Leaves, leaves and more leaves! Yes it's that time of the year! Some will simply "leave" them alone on the ground. That's fine because it creates a micro habitat for insects, reptiles and small mammals. Be sure to remove leaves from impervious surfaces to prevent pollution and harmful algae in our waterways. Others will mulch what falls to enrich the soil. The mulch leaves are like nature's fertilizer! For those wanting a neat, tidy, clean lawn you can remove the leaves and compost them! Bagging is also an option. The County will collect properly bagged leaves on your regular recycling day. These are the best options for dealing with fallen leaves. Leaves simply blown or raked into streets, storm drains, streams, waterways, common areas or piled high are likely to cause more harm than good. Leaves can clog storm drains and stress waterways by releasing harmful nitrogen into the water and block out sunlight which can negatively impact ground and aquatic life. Do your part to help!

This month you can enjoy Halloween Happenings! It will be held outside the clubhouse on Saturday, October 19th from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Come out for the hay rides, pumpkins, face painting, scarecrow making, crafts and much more! Then on Thursday, October 24th from 5:30 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. come Trick-or-Treating at the Cape St. Claire Shopping Center!

**Security:** Gov. Breeden serves on the Eastern District Police Council and stated they will have a meeting on Sep. 18 with speaker Judge Cathy Vitale. Captain Jon Mahaffee is the new captain for the Eastern District.

Strawberry Festival: Gov. Lamb reported planning is continuous.

### **OLD BUSINESS**

Pres. Zadera noted that Mr. Tewey is reviewing policies and procedures and creating a spreadsheet for those to be discussed.

Gov. Breeden reported that Alliance for the Chesapeake put out a Request for Proposal to collect bids for beach restoration design for Sites 3-7. Bio Habitats is continuing their work and permit applications will be filed soon.

Town Manager Tewey noted that the land use agreement to approve the planting plan for Little Magothy beach was signed.

### **NEW BUSINESS**

Mr. Tewey said the auditor is expected to complete the Special Community Benefits District (SCBD) audit by the Sep. 28 deadline and the final carryover number will be supplied to the budget committee.

Pres. Zadera asked about continuing sponsorship of the Cape Elementary Fun Run, the Fire Department, and membership to the Little Magothy River Association and the BCC. There were no objections. An email from the Magothy River Land Trust requested sponsorship. The trust seeks conservation easements along the Magothy River. It was recommended that the organization make a presentation.

### COMMENTS

Becky Benner announced the Garden Club meeting on Oct. 1 at 7:30 pm will feature a presentation by a beekeeper. The Harvest Dinner will be Oct. 19 at Gloria Dei church. Marinara sauce made from vegetables and herbs grown on the farm will be served with pasta, salad and rolls provided by Galway Bay restaurant. Tickets are \$10/adult and \$5/child. The Nov 5th meeting will feature an activity.

Mrs. Benner announced the Goshen Farm Goodies sale on Sep. 21 from 10am-2pm to sell items made from produce harvested from the farm gardens and beehives. Pres. Zadera thanked her for the Friday evening concerts, noting that the family friendly event was enjoyed by many, with the last concert having about 250 people in attendance.

Stacy Wildberger of Cape Conservation Corps (CCC) said Wednesday Weed Warriors will continue through Oct. The plant sale will be held Sep. 21 from 9 am-1 pm. The first Little Learning Library installation is scheduled for Oct. 5. All materials were donated. Planting of 100 trees and shrubs at Little Magothy beach is scheduled for Oct. 18 & 19. Phil Ourisson met with contractors regarding the drainage issues behind the Cape pool/shopping center and the latest quote came in at \$61,000. The Cape Pool may be interested in helping.

### **ADJOURNMENT**

A motion was made to adjourn to closed session and approved unanimously. The meeting was adjourned to closed session at 8:28 pm. The closed session occurred from 8:30 pm to 9:16 pm. Sep. 9, 2024, CSCIA Board of Govs. meeting was adjourned at 9:16 pm.

### The Season of Sweets: Understanding Type 2 Diabetes



### **Hi Capers!**

As we enter the sweet holidays of fall and winter, it is important to be mindful of a health epidemic hiding in plain site. I don't say that to scare you, but Type 2 diabetes and pre-diabetes are on the rise in children and adults and many who have the condition do not know it. According to the Centers for Disease Control (cdc.gov):

"Among U.S. adults aged 18 years or older, crude estimates for 2017–2020 were:

- 38.0% of all U.S. adults had prediabetes, based on their fasting glucose or A1C level)
- 19.0% of adults with prediabetes reported being told by a health professional that they had this condition"



The data from the CDC shows that one-half of the people with pre-diabetes do not know it; and therefore, are most likely are not doing anything to reverse it. Additionally, diagnoses of Type 2 diabetes are on the rise in children and adults. What's shocking is that Type 2 diabetes is an acquired disease and children are acquiring it at an alarmingly increased rate.

The rise of Type 2 diabetes in children and adolescents is particularly worrisome because these children and set up for a host of other health problems if the disease is not treated/controlled.

### What is Type 2 Diabetes?

I wrote a very detailed article on Diabetes in October 2022 and recommend reading that article as well! Diabetes is a disease where the pancreas (an organ in our body) cannot make enough insulin (a hormone) to control the level of sugar in our blood. Our bodies use sugar, called glucose, to function. Our organs work together with our muscles,



fat, and other body cells to use or store glucose. When the body cannot properly use the glucose in the cells for various reasons, the sugar stays in our blood wreaking havoc on our body systems. Although some folks are genetically predispositioned for Type 2 diabetes, for most it is an acquired illness from an unhealthy pattern of poor eating, and lack of exercise. Oddly, smoking also increases one's chance of developing diabetes but non-smokers can acquire it as well through other poor lifestyle choices. Unlike Type 1 diabetes, where the onset is usually in childhood and not related to lifestyle, Type 2 diabetes has direct correlation to the choices we make every day for ourselves and our families.

### Will Eating Sweets at the Holidays Give me Diabetes?

The short answer is: NO! Indulging in sweets around the holidays like a Snickers bar from the Trick or Treat bag, a slice of pumpkin pie, or some holiday cookies won't cause diabetes. The key here is occasional indulgence versus consistently choosing sugary, processed food as a staple in one's diet. Type 2 diabetes is, in most cases, acquired and therefore related to choices made over and over again that contribute to poor health.

### So, What Are the Risk Factors for Type 2 Diabetes?

- Smoking (including history of smoking)
- High Blood Pressure
- Obesity/overweight
- High Cholesterol
- A1C

### A1 What?



An A1c blood test measures the percentage of blood sugar attached to your hemoglobin (a molecule that makes up our blood). This number gives a longer term picture of your blood sugar levels (roughly from the last 3 months). A normal A1c level is 5.7 or less. An A1c should be part of an annual physical and lab work with your Primary Care Physician. Knowing your A1c is one piece of the overall health puzzle of our lives.

### Is there any good news?

Yes! Perhaps the best news of all is that Prediabetes as well as Type 2 diabetes CAN BE REVERSED! That's right—we can cure ourselves! Prediabetes responds very well to diet and exercise modifications and can often save people from needing medication. While the diagnosis of Type 2 Diabetes will be a part of your health record, one can still avoid the need for medication if it is diagnosed early. The "ABCs" of avoiding diabetes are: A1c, Blood Pressure, Cholesterol, and Smoking. Quitting smoking is an obvious choice that few would argue is excellent choice for your health. Blood pressure and cholesterol can be controlled through diet and exercise (and medication when necessary, but we'd like to thwart the need if possible!). 30 minutes of activity, five days a week such as taking a walk to the Main Beach or Lake Claire is all you need! Adding whole foods like fruits and vegetables to half your plate at meal times, and snacking on high fiber foods all add up when building health and avoiding disease (see my "Ream of Paper" article last month!).

### So, why does all this matter?

Bottom line: diabetes is COSTLY! It can cost you your kidneys, heart, and brain as well as your blood vessels because sugary thick blood does not flow well through our organs and wreaks havoc. Diabetes can cost you

your eye sight and bring nerve pain (called neuropathy), and can literally cost your limbs. As an acute care nurse I have seen more lower extremity (toes, foot and leg) amputations directly related to diabetes than I ever have cared to see! The consequences are very real. Additionally, diabetes is costly for your wallet. Statistics from the CDC show that diabetes costs individuals \$12,000 additional dollars annually.

Bottom line: in this upcoming season of sweets, allow a treat, as food is such a part of joy, but you manage your lifestyle in a way that enhances health and well being and avoids costly (life, limb, time, and money) consequences.

## Cape Conservation Corps Fight Against Invasives By Stacey Wildberger

If you spend anytime on social media for the Cape you have probable seen my posts to come out and help us with Weed Warriors. Maybe you are wondering what is it or why are we doing it? We have been focusing on several areas in the community to remove invasive species and plant natives. Our main area of focus has been Serene Ravine, off Lake Claire Dr, Little Magothy Beach Park/Woodland area and the area around the Deep Creek Pier parking area.

### Characteristics of Invasive Species (not all exotics are invasive)

- Impacts the ecology and/or economy to the area it was introduced
- Outcompetes and overwhelms the native flora
- Grows and reproduces fast
- Lack of natural predators to slow their growth (nothing is eating these plants!)

As I mentioned we are combating many different invasive species throughout our community but why do we care and how did they get there? And finally how can you help?

### Why Remove Invasive Species?

They outcompete native plants that native wildlife depends on for survival. These have developed specific relationships over thousands of years of coevolution. Some species are so dependent on specific plants that they can only use that plant to lay eggs on- most think monarch and milkweed but there are thousands more with those specific needs

Invasive plants spread and create monocultures, leading to loss of biodiversity. I can attest to the lack of diversity in the space we have cleared of burning bush at Little Magothy Beach. There was nothing but burning bush for as far as the eye could see. Tucked amongst them were some native sassafras just waiting to for their chance to thrive! We have added some native trees and shrubs in hopes of creating a much more robust ecosystem!

Often the damage caused by invasive species cause irreversible damage to the environment, reduce recreational space and affect human health. There is also a significant economic factor—the time and expense of removing invasive species from a space.

### How do invasive species come into an area?

Invasive species are often sold at our local nurseries. Homeowners believe them to be safe to plant or not harmful because they are so commonly seen on landscapes and sold to us by landscapers and the nursery trade. We plant them on our landscapes and they spread through seed dispersal, wind, and root systems, and not just in our own property but out into common areas or to the wild.

They can come from many unintentional means by humans as well through travel and trade or the soles of our shoes after walking through an infested area.

### What can you do to help stop invasive species?

Buy and plant native plants. Create demand for native plants by asking your local big-box stores to carry more natives. Shop at local native plant nurseries and pop-up sales (like ours in the fall!)

Stop buying and planting invasive species. Just because you don't see it spreading it in your landscape doesn't mean it hasn't spread to other areas. The seeds and roots can travel great distances and create havoc "somewhere out there".

Report invasive species to your local DNR office and request support to remove them.

Check and clean your shoes and your pet's paws and fur after you have been on a hike though the wilderness. Your seeds and their fur can transfer unwanted species to other areas.

Finally, volunteer with a local group to fight invasives that are already here causing issues, reducing biodiversity, outcompeting natives to create monocultures and suppressing the native plants our local fauna need for survival. Even though Weed Warriors officially ended at the end of October due to the lack of light in the evenings we will plan some weekend invasive removals throughout the winter. The English Ivy is easier to spot when all the other plants have died back.
