Board In Brief CSCIA Board Of Governors Monthly Meeting

MAY 12, 2025

In attendance in person: Pres. Jerome Zadera, Govs. Beau Breeden, Cheri Fairchild, Thor Harris, Ed Hayes, Mary Lamb, Matt Layman, Neil Macindoe, and Michele Shipley, Town Manager Frank Tewey, Budget Committee members Charlie Moore and Charlie Shoul, and guests Becky Benner, Charlie Corliss, Scott Patterson, Abby Sparrow and Stacy Wildberger.

Pres. Zadera called the meeting to order at 7:30 pm and wished all moms a happy Mother's Day.

BUILDING VARIANCES

Mr. Tewey introduced requests for variances. The first was for a garage/addition to be built 7 feet from the property line. Building is limited by the well located in front of the house which is situated towards the rear of the property. The county has approved. The second request was for a 6-foot fence extending beyond the front of the house. The odd shaped lot is on a corner so the fence will be 9 feet from the property line and have a 25-foot vision triangle open for traffic line of sight. The third request was for a 1-foot setback for pilings for a boat lift on a narrow lot. The homeowner noted that the pier will be built in the center of the lot to meet setbacks. A pier agreement is in place and a county hearing scheduled. A complaint was received regarding a storage pod. Storage pods are allowed on a homeowner's property for 30 days, or up to 90 for use during active construction. The resident requested to keep the pod through Oct. while completing interior home improvements. Decisions would be made in closed session.

MINUTES AND FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Minutes of the Apr. 7, 2025 BOG meeting were reviewed. A motion to accept the minutes was made and passed unanimously.

The financial statements for March were reviewed. A motion was made to approve. Balances of bank accounts on Mar. 30 were approximately: Operating funds/Grants: \$367,000, piers- \$390,000 and Special Community Benefits District (SCBD)- \$485,000. Gov. Breeden noted that a separate line item for Capital Reserve spending should be added to the budget and reports to accurately reflect expenses. It is hoped that all necessary changes will be made by the end of the fiscal year. The motion to approve passed unanimously.

TOWN MANAGER REPORT

Mr. Tewey reported on the following:

Blue parking stickers and hang tags are required as of May 1. Beach attendants will start May 16.

The first Budget Committee meeting was held May 1. Subsequent meetings will be July 15, Aug. 13, and Sep. 10.

Officers are covering 20 of 31 days in May. Crime reports included 9 calls in Feb. No trends or patterns to be concerned about.

The chain link fence behind the clubhouse was installed. Additional portable restrooms will be delivered May 23rd. The Cape St Claire entrance sign on Cape St Claire Rd is peeling and the sign manufacturer will inspect. Twenty-one of the beach attendants from 2024 will be returning for this season. Beach coverage will run from May 16- Sept 1.

Two standard fence requests were approved. There was no activity by the county regarding a stop work order issued for a shed without permits. Mr. Tewey got a list of short-term rentals registered with the county. He will provide a policy proposal for beach use by renters.

A bill before the county council proposes that Homeowner Associations (HOA) follow the Maryland Homeowners Association Act and Open Meetings Act, making all meetings open to the public and available to be recorded and broadcast by anyone, including the press. There could be a significant administrative fee with future increases. The bill was introduced due to issues that arose with two Special Community Benefit Districts (SCBD) that did not have proper checks and balances in place. CSCIA follows all the SCBCD reporting and recording requirements and has systems in place to prevent impropriety. Councilwoman Fiedler requested feedback from CSCIA. Discussion followed, and several points were made that will be relayed to Mrs. Feidler: The HOA Act should not apply because not all SCBDs are communities, for example the Little Magothy River Association; the attorney does not think the bill will stand up to legal review; the administrative fee is excessive and adds no benefit; the reaction to the issues at two small HOAs is excessive and punitive to those that are following the rules; SCBD rules change constantly and there is no support or advocacy for HOAs and SCBDs to navigate the system. Additional concerns are that recordings can be edited to make out-of-context quotes that give an incorrect impression of actual event, or artificial intelligence used to manipulate and misrepresent it.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Broadneck Council of Communities (BCC): Gov. Breeden reported that elected officials and the Maryland Transportation Authority and State Highway Administration attended the Apr. meeting to report on plans for 2025 Bay Bridge traffic studies and bridge replacement. The only exit to be closed for part of 2025 summer weekends will be Oceanic Drive. The bay crossing will happen at the current bridge site. Currently in the 7th year of Step 2 of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA), completion is expected around 2042.

Beaches & Parks: The Maryland Department of the Environment (MDE) has not rescinded the open permit at Lake Claire that was to be cancelled after the Deep Creek dredge could not be completed. It must be closed before a permit can be approved for placement of sand from the Little Magothy dredge. BioHabitats is working to quickly answer questions from the new Army Corps of Engineers reviewer to keep the project on schedule for an Aug./Sep. meeting. Coastal Resources has been chosen to do design work and contracts are being prepared for the other 5 sites planned for restoration.

Caper: Gov. Lamb reported the Caper was put online, but due to an error by the printer, it will be mailed late.

Clubhouse: Gov. Lamb is having trouble getting anyone to replace the door locks. The Cape Clean Up event will have only two dumpsters on Friday, replaced on Saturday. The county is encouraging use of curbside pickup. Items that can be disposed of at the Clean Up could be picked up curbside. No hazardous waste, large metal objects, gasoline, etc. See the county website for more information.

Events: The special events permit for July 4 and Strawberry Festival cost \$1500. Gov. Lamb requested a waiver but has no reply yet.

Piers: Gov. Breeden said about 25 people attended the May meeting. He commended Piers Administrator Matt Cox on his good work communicating with slip renters and the waitlist, which is now about 130 people. Contracts for the pier replacement at Deep Creek have been signed, with work to occur in the fall. There are cash reserves to fully fund the contract, electrical and plumbing work, and cover the piers portion of Capital Reserve

As July approaches, fireworks will take to the skies. For safety reasons and because some vets and pets are affected by them we ask you to leave the fireworks to the professionals. Groundbased (non-aerial) sparklers, hand held sparklers and "snappers" are the only fireworks allowed under the law.

Don't forget to celebrate the 4th of July with us! We're planning a morning parade, activities for the children and a night of fireworks at Main Beach courtesy our neighbors to the north, Gibson Island!

For our slip holders: Boat bottoms should have gotten wet on or before June 1st! If you were unable to get your boat into the water by that date, please contact the Piers Administrator!

savings. Subleases may be available after moves are completed. Email piersadmin@cscia.org if you are interested in a temporary slip. Fetch Consulting was hired to get marina basin designations at four of our properties to allow for smaller repairs without needing permits from MDE and Army Corps of Engineers, just the county.

Strawberry Festival: Gov. Lamb said a vendor meeting will be held Wednesday. The insurance carrier used in the past will not provide coverage because of pony rides. The vendor has insurance, but the Strawberry Festival needs coverage as well. The insurance agent is confident that he can find a company to cover it, but it may cost more than in past years.

OLD BUSINESS

Pres. Zadera reported that the on ramp to Route 50 at Oceanic Drive will be the only Bay Bridge access closed for Friday evenings this summer. Repairs and expansion of the kayak rack at Lake Claire is near completion, contact Dave Draper with questions. Meetings with the Business Lot Owners Association (BLOA) will be held regularly to increase communication in that partnership. It seems that the public outcry regarding development at Fairwinds Marina was considered by the owners and no movement has been made to pursue it further.

NEW BUSINESS

Gov. Lamb reported that the traffic dividing island on Green Holly Dr was installed with an open area for plants with the understanding that it would be maintained by CSCIA and not the county. With the Garden Club unable to continue to maintain it, the county wants to remove the plants and install pavers.

Pres. Zadera reminded everyone to be mindful of the increased activity at Lake Claire during Youth Sailing, June 30-Aug 8. The Little Firefighters Library project will be installed after the Strawberry Festival.

COMMENTS

Charlie Corliss thanked the board for supporting Cape Vibes events. The first event on Mother's Day was very well attended, with over 100 attendees and plenty of volunteer help. The Cape Garden Club was the beneficiary of donations made. The next event will be June 22 and donations will go to the Cape Conservation Corps (CCC). Gov. Lamb noted that the event was well organized.

Becky Benner announced that the Garden Club Plant Sale May 17 from 8-2 at the clubhouse field. Native plants, Cape grown perennials, vegetables, tomatoes, herbs and annual flowers will be available. Get your gardening questions answered too! The last spring meeting will be June 3 at the clubhouse at 7 pm. Meetings will resume for the fall on Sep. 2.


Mrs. Benner reported Goshen Farm will give away strawberry plants at the Strawberry Festival. The Open House is June 21 from 10am-2pm. There will be tours of the property, pony rides, music, etc. In response to a question about a Halloween event, she replied they do not want to encourage rumors of the house being haunted. People are on farm premises on Halloween to prevent vandalism.

Stacey Wildberger of Cape Conservation Corps (CCC) reported they have been removing Bushkiller vine from Serene Ravine. Richards Tree Care removed a tree at Little Magothy Beach and did a great job of avoiding damage to plantings. All slots are filled for the tree giveaway program. The Habitat Hero tour was held May 6. With two outstanding applications for the scholarship for a Broadneck High senior planning to major in environmental sciences, a second smaller scholarship was created. Congratulations to winners Addison Thornton and London Best! CCC will give away milkweed plants at the Strawberry Festival and have a table at the Goshen Farm Open House. Thanks to Cape Vibes for choosing CCC as the beneficiary of donations at the June event.

Thor Harris reported the Cape pool will open on Memorial Day weekend with a party on May 24. Swim practices start in the evenings on May 27 until the end of the school year, then move to mornings. A Movie by the Pool event is scheduled for Jun. 7 at 8:30 pm. The 5th grade party for Cape St Claire Elementary School will be Jun. 11. There will be live music opening weekend. They are grateful to the CSCIA board for their support, guidance and conversations.

ADJOURNMENT

A motion was made to adjourn to closed session and approved unanimously. The meeting was adjourned to a closed session at 9:00 pm. The closed session occurred from 9:00 pm to 10:35 pm. The May 12, 2025 CSCIA Board of Govs. meeting was adjourned at 10:35 pm.

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


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Mosquito Control Tip of the Month

Hopefully you read the May Caper and learned that mosquito spraying does not work on the Asian Tiger Mosquito plaguing our community, but it also kills beneficial insects, including butterflies and bees so many of us our attracting to our yard with native plants. Please pick up an opt out form at the CSCIA office or go online so your yard will not be sprayed every Monday night. You can help control them by eliminating the places they lay their babies! Remove all standing water from your property or use mosquito dunks in bird baths and ponds.

Common Cape Invasives, How to Get Rid of Them and Replace Them With Similar Natives

Characteristics of Non-Native Invasive Species (not all non-natives are invasive)

- Impacts the ecology and/or economy to the area it was introduced
- Outcompetes and overwhelms the native flora
- Grows and reproduces fast
- Lacks native predators to slow their growth (nothing is eating these plants!)

Why Remove Invasive Species

They outcompete native plants that native wildlife depends on for survival. These have developed specific relationships over thousands of years of coevolution. Some species are so dependent on specific plants to feed on or that they can only use a certain plant to lay eggs on, for example, monarch butterflies and milkweed. But there are many more with such specific needs.

Invasive plants spread and create monocultures, leading to loss of biodiversity. I can attest to the lack of diversity in the space we have cleared of burning bush at Little Magothy Beach. There was nothing but burning bush as far as the eye could see. Tucked amongst them were some native sassafras just waiting for their chance to thrive. We have added some native trees and shrubs in hopes of creating a much more robust ecosystem!

Often the damage caused by invasive species cause irreversible damage to the environment, reduce recreational space and affect human health. There is also a significant economic factor—the time and expense of removing invasive species from a space.

How Invasive Species Come Into An Area

Invasive species are often sold at our local nurseries. Homeowners believe them to be safe to plant or not harmful because they are so commonly seen on landscapes and sold to us by landscapers and the nursery trade. We plant them on our landscapes and they spread through seed dispersal, wind, and root systems, and not just in our own property but out into common areas or to the wild. They can come from many unintentional means by humans as well through travel and trade or the soles of our shoes after walking through an infested area.

How You Can Help Stop Invasive Plants

Don't buy non-native invasive plants! Just because you don't see it spreading it in your landscape doesn't mean it hasn't spread to other areas. The seeds and roots can travel great distances and create

havoc somewhere out there. That non-native invasive, sacred bamboo, the nursery tells you is a variety, it will eventually revert to producing seed. The invasive Bradford pear that we were told was sterile is now along every corridor on the east coast. Create demand for native plants by asking your local big-box stores to carry more natives. Shop at local native plant nurseries and pop-up sales (such as the Cape Conservation Corps plant sales)

Common Cape Invasives

There are many invasive plant species in the yards and open spaces of the Cape. The small trees, shrubs, vines, herbaceous, and grass plants listed below are among the most common and are the worst of the worst invasives as they are known to spread aggressively by seed or roots. They are also more easily removed by homeowners compared with invasives such as grown trees, bamboo, and phragmites reeds.










Bay Sound, Local Soul: Dirk Schwenk and Kevin Pezzuti Bring Cape St. Claire's Spirit to the Stage

Cape St. Claire is more than just a waterfront neighborhood — it's a community shaped by hard work, a strong commitment to family, and a deep pride in everything that makes the Cape unique. Within our neighborhood, you might be surprised by how many talented, creative musicians are living just down the street.

Few musicians embody this Cape spirit as fully as Dirk Schwenk and Kevin Pezzuti, two musicians whose roots in the Cape run as deep as the waters that surround it.

Dirk Schwenk, a Cape native and longtime Cape St. Claire resident, has been a musical fixture in the area for years. Known for his storytelling lyrics and signature blend of Americana, rock, and coastal folk, Schwenk draws much of his inspiration from life in the Cape. Whether it's a lyric born from a sunset over Deep Creek or a melody that echoes from Lake Claire, his music is a direct extension of the place he calls home.

"I've raised my kids here, built friendships here, and written a lot of songs staring out over the water," Schwenk says. "There's something about Cape St. Claire — it's laid-back but full of life. That energy comes with me on stage every time."

Kevin Pezzuti, who has called Cape St. Claire home for many years, brings that same deep connection to the community.

A versatile instrumentalist and gifted collaborator, Pezzuti has become a vital part of the local music scene through his work in both formal venues and informal community spaces. Known for his skills on guitar, keys, and harmonies, he's just as likely to be found at a neighborhood cookout as he is on stage at Rams Head or 49 West.

"Cape's a tight-knit place, and music here feels like a shared language," Pezzuti notes. "Playing with Dirk — especially when we're just down the street from people we know — is something special. It's not just a gig; it's home."

Together, Schwenk and Pezzuti blend their talents into a sound that is both refined and deeply familiar, full of storytelling, harmony, and heart. Their recent performances have drawn acclaim for their dynamic live shows, often described as "equal parts front-porch jam and full-scale concert." Audiences love their mix of original songs and inventive covers, and there's always a sense that you're watching two friends doing what they love — and bringing their neighborhood along for the ride.

This summer, as they take the stage at our local Strawberry Festival on June 7th and Cape Vibes Sunset Concert at Main Beach on June 22, their Cape St. Claire roots will be front and center.

Their music captures the charm and traditions of the Cape while paying tribute to the people, places, and strong community bonds that have shaped its identity.

CURBSIDE COLLECTION OF BULK ITEMS

Large Plastic Items:

Large plastic items such as children's toys and playsets can be recycled. The items should be placed next to your recycling container(s) with other paper, plastic, metal and glass recyclables on your collection day.

Large Metal Items and Refrigerated Appliances:

Large metal items and <u>appliances</u>, like washers, dryers, refrigerators and lawn mowers, can be recycled. Call Customer Service at (410) 222-6100 to schedule a collection or schedule online. Metal items that will fit in your vehicle should be brought to one of our recycling centers for recycling.

Call (410) 222-6100, Monday through Friday, between 7:30 a.m. and 4 p.m. to schedule large metal item collection.

- Items must be ready at the curb by 6 a.m. on the scheduled collection day.
- Cancellations must be received 48-hours prior to the scheduled collection date.
- Only those items specifically requested for collection will be picked up.
- Be sure items are not obstructed by vehicles, fences, or other structures.

Large Trash Items:

<u>Bulk trash items</u> like, sofas, mattresses, tables, and rolls of carpet are typical trash examples that do not fit into containers. The items should be placed next to your trash container(s) on your collection day. Please set out only three items at a time on your weekly collection day. Do not place wood and lumber or building and construction materials for collection as bulky trash. These items are not collected curbside.

Please consider donating your usable items to a charitable organization. Some organizations offer free collection for items in good condition. View the <u>Reduce & Reuse</u> page for details.
